PRESIDENTIAL REPORT

The highlight of the 1984 squash season was the historic win of Susan Devoy in the British Open in early April. This magnificent victory was undoubtedly the greatest achievement yet of any New Zealand squash player, and accordingly has had an unprecedented impact on the sport in this country.

A great number of squash followers have been very aware of the potential Susan has possessed for some years, however, the manner in which she defeated both the first and second world ranked players to achieve the title was tremendous. An official presentation from the N.Z.S.R.A. was made to Susan during the North Island Championships at Hamilton.

Following the success of last years Mens World Championships held in New Zealand, one of the main tasks of the N.Z.S.R.A. has been to ensure a follow-up to the publicity during that event and to maintain squash in the news and public eye. The resulting media coverage given to Susan's victory ensured front line exposure for squash and we could not have asked for a better promotion either in New Zealand or overseas.

We are extremely fortunate to have two women and two men who rank among the world's best and who perform with great credit to New Zealand overseas. Susan Devoy and Robyn Blackwood have given womens squash a terrific boost here, and the Honda Test series between the Australian and New Zealand women in September was a great success even though we failed to win the series. Stuart Davenport reached the semi-finals in the British Open, and Ross Norman after his unfortunate accident last year has made a remarkable comeback, and he returned to New Zealand to win the Adidas National Championships and the Honda City New Zealand Open.

The 1984 Adidas National Championships were staged in Napier and congratulations must go to both Ross Norman and Susan Devoy in each winning the titles for the second time. Auckland won the 'double' in the teams event including regaining the mens inter-district title it lost to Wellington last year.

The Adidas Championship Series, in its fourth year, is now well established and continues to be well supported by the players on the domestic scene. The grand finals held at Henderson S.R.C. were won by Susan Devoy and Paul Viggers. This year some significant changes were made to the format of the championship, among them each qualifying tournament received a grading in relation to the prize money offered, and qualifying points being awarded in relation to the grading each tournament receives.

In November last year, Bill McKenna resigned as our National Coaching Director, and I would like to record our appreciation to Bill for his efforts during the two years he was in the position. The National Squash Schools held so successfully in January this year at Auckland, Wellington and Dunedin were a tribute to his organisational ability, and should now become an annual event. In July Tom McQueen was appointed the new Coaching Director in a part-time roll, after a complete review of the National Coaching Scheme had been undertaken. Dardir el Bakary has continued to play an important role as our National Coach, and his contribution to squash at all levels over the years has been outstanding.

During the year an International Development Programme was established, which will be on-going and, based on long term planning, will ensure New Zealand has a revolving and ever increasing group of internationally ranked players, supported by up and coming players who show international potential from an early age. The immediate objective over the next three years will be to lift the New Zealand international playing standard at senior level and in doing so improve rankings in the World Teams Championships from 5th place presently in the mens to 3rd in 1985 and to 2nd in 1987; and in the women from 3rd at present to 1st in 1985 and again in 1987, 32 players have

initially been named in the International Development Group which commences operation from I October, 1984, and the programme will be closely inter-related with the National Coaching Scheme.

Following the Stazenger Under 23 Championship a New Zealand Youth Team was named for an internal tour of the northern half of the North Island. The team consisting of four men and two women, including both the Stazenger Under 23 winners Donna Gurran and Danny McQueen, was managed by Peter Hagan.

In September an official New Zealand Masters team competed in the Australian Masters Championships in Brisbane and participated in a Test Series with the Australians. Although we were unsuccessful in winning the test series two members of the team. Marge Bowers and Arthur Wright, won their respective age group titles in the Australian Masters Championships. Congratulations to them both, and to Rob Roche whose untiring efforts have ensured the continued growth and success of Masters squash in New Zealand.

A large group of supporting Masters players accompanied the official team to Australia and from all accounts the trip was a tremendous success, and should now become a regular home and away fixture with the Australians.

Hertz Reut-a-Car have provided substantial sponsorship for Masters squash and the third Hertz New Zealand Masters Championship was held most successfully at Palmerston North over Labour Weekend.

The New Zealand Squash Centre with its twelve courts continues to prosper under the efficient management of Nick Cass, whose efforts and dedication cannot be too highly recommended. During the year the facilities were further upgraded by the construction of a new mens changing room.

In April this year the Executive Director and I attended a Tasman Exchange meeting in Brisbane with the Australian S.R.A. This meeting was fairly successful overall and the spirit between our two associations to ensure that the "Tasman Exchange" agreement is ongoing, is very strong. As part of the agreement two of our referees attended the Australian Championalitys in October.

The continued assistance to our Association from both the Ministry of Recreation and Sport, who help fund our coaching programme, and the New Zealand Sports Foundation who assist our leading and developing players, is much appreciated.

In late September the Honda City N.Z. Open was held at the Herderson S.R.C. and we were fortunate in having so many of the worlds leading players in attendance. Congratulations to our National Champions Susan and Ross for their memorable victories in this event.

Earlier in the year we had hoped that the inaugural Asian Pacific Circuit involving Singapore, Malaysia, N.Z. and Australia would get off to a good start with all four countries participating in the circuit, however, at a late stage Australia decided they would not be part of the circuit this year, a decision which meant that the chances of obtaining more top players to our Open event was missed due to the extra travel costs of coming down from Singapore for only the one event. It is hoped that this situation will be rectified for next year as it is essential for the four countries to combine to form a viable circuit to attract top players to this part of the world.

As already mentioned the media coverage of squash this year has been greater than ever before, and our thanks must go to Television New Zealand, the Radio and various Newspapers throughout the country for the coverage given.

The previously known Junior Management Committee was replaced during the year by an Executive Junior Squash Committee of five personnel, comprising the National Director

of Junior Squash, the Convenor of Junior Selectors, and three District Junior Directors / Convenors from areas including the upper North Island, lower North Island and the South Island. Thanks must go to Lois Smith and her committee for all their efforts in promoting and planning Junior Squash during another busy season. Earlier this year a Junior Boys team managed by John Anderson travelled to Canada to compete at the Junior World Championships and finished a rather disappointing seventh, a position we will be out to improve on in 1986 when the event is held in Australia. The Slazenger N.Z. Junior Open titles held at Whakatane were won by overseas players, namely Gary Waite from Canada and Lim Soek Hui from Singapore. The attendance of overseas players provided plenty of international flavour but highlighted the dearth of top N.Z. players in the older age groups in particular. Justine Marriott and Marie Pearson were named at the conclusion of the event to travel to the Australian Junior Championships held in October. Glen Wilson and Darrin Nicholls attended the Malaysian Junior Championship, and congratulations to Glen on winning the Under 16 title, while Darrin finished 3rd in the Under 18 event.

Our full-time Executive Director, Bill Murphy continues to make a significant contribution and impact on the game. The roll of Executive Director requires constant communication with other administrators, players, coaches, referees, and various other officials as well as the responsibility of preparing and distributing reports, correspondence and many varied documents throughout the country and also overseas. The arrangement and attendance at many meetings and events is also a constant demand requiring work in the evenings and weekends throughout the year. The fact that Bill is able to fulfil the requirements of his position with such success as well as being able to retain the respect and friendship of so many is attributed to his temperament and capabilities and also to the support and assistance he receives from his wife, Anne. We are indeed extremely fortunate to have Bill as our Executive Director and we sincerely appreciate their great contribution to N.Z. squash. Steps will have to be taken in the near future however to ease the workload of the Executive Director so that his wide experience can be channelled into key areas leaving the more routine items to be handled by another person.

On behalf of the Association I must record our sincere appreciation to all major sponsors and in particular N.Z.M.C. Limited, the franchise holders of Honda, for their generous sponsorship of the Honda City N.Z. Open, and the Honda Test Series between the Australian and N.Z. women, and our womens team to the World Championships in Ireland next year. The association we have had with N.Z.M.C. in the short period of their involvement in N.Z. squash has been extremely successful.

Our appreciation must also go to Adidas for their continued sponsorship of the Adidas Championships and National Championships, as well as outfitting our national sides. To Hertz Rent-a-Car with Masters squash, and Slazengers in both the Junior and Under 23 areas, and to Sun Alliance Insurance in the Refereeing field. Next year it is hoped we will be able to have the National Graded Teams Championship and part of our Coaching Scheme sponsored.

1984 saw seven new District delegates to the Management Committee and the resulting re-organisation of sub-committees meant that the experienced members remaining on the Management Committee had increased workloads. However all members contributed to the smooth running of the Associations affairs throughout the past season, and all players should be aware of the efforts put in by administrators at considerable personal sacrifice to enable our sport to be successfully administered.

I would like to thank the National Directors of Statisticians, Trish Lee and Gower Dallimore for their continued efforts in ensuring players gradings are uniform throughout the country. With some Districts now experimenting with computer grading lists it appears that it will only be a matter of time before a computer grading list is adopted nationally.

Particular thanks also must be expressed to Dennis Winch, the National Director of Refereeing, the National Refereeing Committee and the referees throughout the country who have so actively participated in the successful running of tournament squash this past 12 months.

This time last year Bruce Davidson replaced Michael Fenton as our representative to the International Squash Rackets Federation. Our appreciation must go to Michael for the time and efforts he put into the role for the two years he held the position, and to Bruce Davidson for his efforts in the past 12 months. Thanks must also go to Susie Simcock who continues to represent the N.Z.S.R.A. on the Womens International Squash Rackets Federation and we would congratulate her on being elected as Vice Chairman of that body.

It is also significant to mention that during the year Robyn Blackwood was accorded the honour of being elected as Chairman of the newly formed Womens Squash Players Association.


After three years of more or less static membership numbers, 1984 has shown a very pleasing increase of virtually 6% or 3038 members, bringing the total affiliated members of the association to 53852. The publicity and promotion achieved for the sport, as a combined result of the Pilkington World Championships, the National Squash Weeks and other planned N.Z.S.R.A. promotional activities are considered the major factors behind the increase. With the continued high profile of the sport this year especially gained through our top player achievements, and the continuation of the N.Z.S.R.A. promotional programme, we can confidently look forward to another growth year being recorded in 1985.

The future funding of the Association, to tie in with the three year Corporate Plan established in 1983, received considerable attention by Management during the year, and the creation of two Reserve Funds, one for Capital Investment and the other for International Events, are seen as essential financial moves to cater for the future of New Zealand squash. These reserve funds are expanded on further in the financial report however due to the enormous amount of work put in by the organising committee under the leadership and direction of Rod Sturm, the Pilkington World Championships staged in October 1983 eventuated in being run at a surplus of just over \$37,000. This surplus, along with the increased funding now available from the Roy Mitchell Estate Trust will provide a sound base for the International fund.

1985 will be an interesting and challenging year with the main needs being, to continue the progress already made by the creation of the International Development Programme, continued publicity and promotion of our sport to increase membership, capitalising on the successes of our internationally ranked players, a fully supported Asian Pacific Circuit incorporating the N.Z. Open to become our annual showpiece of top level squash, and arriving at a solution to the question of the split of prize-money between men and women at tournaments.

Finally, I wish to express my thanks to all concerned for the many courtesies and assistance afforded during the past twelve months. I have found it a rewarding experience and it has been an honour and pleasure to serve you as President.



INTERNATIONAL EVENTS AND TOURS

SUB-COMMITTEE

There has been a substantial change during the past twelve months in the basis of planning by this Committee. After careful consideration an entire new planning programme has been adopted with a view to New Zealand squash endeavouring to set its goals first and then spend its funds to achieve those goals, rather than to respond to external stimulus and spend its money accordingly. The result has been the adoption of the International Development Programme which came fully into operation at the beginning of October. The general outline of the programme being briefly:

- (a) To have an ongoing programme, based on long term planning, that will ensure New Zealand Squash has a revolving and ever increasing group of internationally ranked players supported by up and coming players who show international potential from an early age.
- (b) All future international event participation, overseas and internal tours and player development at all senior, youth and junior levels (except Masters) will be embraced into the programme. New Zealand will continue to enter teams for the senior world championships automatically, however, although the general policy will be also to enter teams in all future junior world championships, in each case a final decision on entering will be left until the latest practical date with entry only to be confirmed if the players in the relevant training group for the championships are considered to be up to a required standard.
- (c) The selection of the group of players, initially comprising 32 men and women, lavolves young players from 12 years of age and upwards through to the established internationally ranked players. The group will receive special programming under the guidance of individual coach/advisors, special coaching and training assistance, and assistance to tournaments. Except in the case of the very young players, the principle will be that those players playing the sport full time, or playing the game as their priority will be considered for the group.
- (d) By necessity the programme will work very closely in with the National Coaching Programme and has been financially established drawing on funds from coaching, the previous assistance to players budget, and an additional allocation of funds.
- (e) One of the immediate objectives over the next three years will be to lift the New Zealand international playing standard at senior level and in doing so improve rankings in world team championships as follows:

Men - 5th to 3rd in the world by 1985 and to 2nd in 1987.

Women - from 3rd to 1st in 1985 and again in 1987

Although the success of the programme will not be immediately evident, the Committee considers the long term benefits to New Zealand squash will be substantial indeed, by ensuring that our younger players will have far better opportunities to be prepared for the demands of international squash by the time they reach the stage of embarking on a full time career in the sport or reaching a desired level of ability to represent New Zealand in the international field.

OVERSEAS TOURS

The only New Zealand Team to trek overseas in the past 12 months was the New Zealand Junior Mens Team that competed in the World Championships in Canada during April. By New Zealand's previous standards this was a very inexperienced team that went away under the managership of John Anderson. A seventh placing highlighted this fact but also the competition in Canada showed that there had been noticeable improvement in a number of squash nations that New Zealand previously would have been expected to comfortably beat.

INTERNAL TOURS

The Australian Womens Team toured New Zealand for a much awaited three Test Series, coming into the South Island and playing the first Test in Dunedin which had not seen an International match for a number of years. This was the first occasion that a New Zealand Senior Team were looked upon as a serious challenge to their Australian counterparts, in New Zealand at least, and while the Australians proved to be too strong in the final outcome, the Series attained unprecedented public following and the promotion of the sport reached a further upward level. Sponsorship of the Series by N.Z.M.C. Limited under the Honda franchise, was a new innovation and one which proved very successful.

YOUTH TEAM - INTERNAL TOUR

The traditional concept of an internal tour by a New Zealand Under 23 Team was changed somewhat this year as the first implementation of the newly introduced International Development Programme. Whereas in the past the team had comprised Under 23 players who had competed in the Slazenger N.Z., Guder 23 Champsonships this years Team was selected under a criteria with no age restrictions but within an objective to increase. From New Zealand youth ranks, the strength of candidates for the New Zealand teams which are to compete in the 1985 World Championships.

The tour itinerary structure was also altered so that the players, in between the major tournaments of the limerary, spent the remainder of the time in special training.

OVERSEAS JUNIORS TO NEW ZEALAND

It was encouraging to have two leading Australian Under 17 Junior Men and Women compete in the New Zealand Junior Open Champtonships in Whakatane in August along with the top male Canadian Junior and the exciting young Singapore temale prospect. These players dominated the New Zealand Junior Championships and again highlighted the definite superiority currently held over our top Junior players, emphasising the importance of the establishment of the International Development Group aimed at improving New Zealand standard at this level as well as the open International level.

NEW ZEALAND JUNIORS OVERSEAS

Justine Marriott and Marie Pearson attended the Australian Junior Championships under the Tasman Exchange agreement. Both players found the competition far too strong although Marie Pearson played well to win the Plate Event.

Glen Wilson and Darrin Nicholls completed in the Malaysian Junior Championships performing very creditably. Glen Wilson won the Boys Under 14 Championship while Darrin Nicholls finished third in the Under 18 Championships.

NEW ZEALAND SPORTS FOUNDATION and PLAYER ASSISTANCE

The New Zealand Sports Foundation has again played a major part in assisting New Zealand squash players this year. Continued assistance to Susan Devoy and Robyn Blackwood enabled both of these players to embark on overseas trips again to the United Kingdom. Anthony McMurtrie and Donna Gurran were also recipients of Development Grants with the aim of launching them into International rankings.

All these players, and others, received travel assistance from the N.Z.S.R.A. as part of the player assistance programme which from now on will be directly linked to the International Development Programme.

INTERNATIONAL PLAYERS

The highlight this year for New Zealand squash has undoubtedly been the achievement of Susan Devoy in winning the British Open. This achievement ranks at the highest level of sporting achievements and has had a marvellous affect on the game in New Zealand. Squash in New Zealand will receive the benefit of the promotion and exposure gained from her win for a considerable period of time. Susan has also achieved the World No. 1 womens ranking and has continued with her fine form culminating in winning the 1984 Honda City New Zealand Open, which was the source of considerable satisfaction to her and of vital importance to New Zealand Squash.

Ross Norman has in the course of the past 12 months made a comeback to the sport that is nothing short of miraculous. After initial indications being that Ross would be unlikely to

play again he has now made a comeback which has put him back in the top ten ranked players in the world and culminated in his winning the 1984 Honda City New Zealand Open during the course of which he decisively defeated the three best players Australia has to offer.

Stuart Davenport has continued with his tremendous progress and during the latter part of the year was ranked No. 3 in the world, which is the highest ranking ever achieved by a New Zealand male player. With Stuart and Ross forming the basis of the New Zealand Men's team our prospects in the 1985 World Championships in Egypt look very favourable.

Robyn Blackwood has in the past 12 months received some setbacks in results however towards the end of our season was once again showing the form which took her to her previous high world ranking and with her and Susan forming the basis for the New Zealand Women's team in Ireland in 1985 the stage is set for a very successful result in both Mens and Womens Teams events next year.

HONDA CITY NEW ZEALAND OPEN

This years New Zealand Open proved to be one of the most successful ever held. The fields for both events were excellent with the Womens field containing the best women players in the world. The generous Honda sponsorship by NZMC Ltd guaranteed the success of the Open and a continued commitment by NZMC for future years will ensure that it remains a major world event. The results from a New Zealand point of view could hardly have been better with victories by Susan and Ross and excellent television coverage assisting the promotion of the sport.

NATIONAL EVENTS

The National Events Committee is the largest of all Management Sub-Committees and each member has their own portfolio to deal with. This system keeps all aspects of the playing side of squash on the New Zealand domestic scene ticking over, and constantly being monitored.

The success of the revamped Adidas series would be the highlight of the National Events scene for 1984. All other events, from the Slazenger N.Z. Under 23 Championships at Easter to the N.Z. Hertz Masters Championships at Labour Weekend had good entries and were keenly contested.

Our grateful thanks to all those Clubs throughout the country that hosted the thirteen National Tournaments on the calendar as well as those Clubs who hosted qualifying events in the Adidas Series.

The Committee held three meetings during the year and one telephone meeting. At all times though members were regularly in contact with each other.

Once again having the Players Representative on the Committee proved invaluable on many occasions. Our thanks to Tony Naughton for his time and efforts.

At its May meeting the Committee were unanimous in their decision that the N.Z.S.R.A. should leave no stone unturned in their efforts to get Ross Norman and Stuart Davenport back for the National Championships. We appreciate the fact that management can only go to certain limits in these circumstances and thank those that put in a very great effort. The reward was that Ross Norman did return to win the National title and his presence certainly added to a great Nationals at Napier.

Ross Normans subsequent winning of the N.Z. Open title showed he lost little or nothing in returning to New Zealand in August, although missing some of the more lucrative competition overseas.

With another highly successful Nationals in Napier, it brings forward the question of just when to schedule our National Championships in tourne years. Until there is a more stable International tournament schedule during August and September we will have to continue to chop and change our dates around. This Committee is most adamant that every endeavour should be made each year to schedule a suitable date to allow our top players to return from overseas. We have established a good spread of the Adidas series through the season, so the early September scheduling of the Nationals seems to be ideal and is aimed to give a lead into the N.Z. Open. This Committee sees the scheduling of the Nationals as a continuing problem and one that will not be easily solved.

The Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup competitions had record entries this year, while the National Club Teams Championships (Graded Teams Event) were short of teams in the B Grade. Full complements were entered in all the lower grades. The areas of eligibility and gradings still cause a great deal of concern.

In an effort to "educate" Clubs and players into doing the right things as regards the National Club Teams Championships, a circular was sent to all clubs in April. We are convinced, and in some cases it is a fact, that this circular was just filed and not displayed on Club Notice Boards as requested. Had the message contained therein been heeded, then some of the problems of grading lists, rules, entry and travel could well have been avoided.

Again we had the usual spate of applications for players to be added to the respective grading lists for the teams events. Of the \$1 handled by the Convenor, 43 were approved for addition. In some cases it was difficult to determine responsibility for errors, and also the timing of correspondence for additions or deletions from grading lists.

This Committee is currently looking into this whole aspect for 1985. One thought being investigated is the registration of all players, similar to District players, and the timing of grading lists in their relation to the playing of the teams events.

The other area of concern is the large number of regradings that take place after the publication of the 15 June list, i.e. in the 15 August list. Some of these players move up two grades but are still eligible to play in their 15 June grade. This area of grading needs to be closely looked at by our National and District Directors of Statisticians. Corrective measures must be taken by Statisticians or the National Events Committee will act.

At this stage most of the Committee members will be returning for 1985 and we welcome Hugh Leabourn, the new Players Representative. We hope we can further build on what has been established in 1984 and some of the problems, especially in the National Club Teams Chempionships can be resolved to make it easier for players and organisers alike.

Finally, thanks to all members of the Committee for their efforts and work over the year.

PROMOTION AND PUBLICITY

M.S. Greig (Convenor)

This year has seen the membership levels of existing clubs increase by a total of 1832 players which represents an increase of 3.6%. To this is added 10 new clubs with a total membership of 1228, which has resulted in our overall affiliated membership growing by 6%, to in excess of 53,000 members.

This growth is a most satisfactory reversal to the trend of nil and negative growth that we have experienced for the past three years, following the explosive boom of the 1970's where over a period of 7 years the growth rate saw the affiliated numbers virtually double from 26,500 to 51,900.

Even with growth in the numbers of clubs and commercial squash courts it is unlikely that we will return to the situation in the 70's where there was a great unsatisfied demand with people just waiting for squash courts to be built. Also we are competing against a wider variety of leisure activities all being promoted to the public, therefore it is now necessary to promote the sport and its benefits, and the club advantages and facilities, on a continual basis both to current affiliated members and to potential new members.

To this end the N.Z.S.R.A. has held a National Squash Week for the last two years. The overall impact of these weeks may not appear at first to be very great and considerable organisation is required both at a national level and more particularly at club level. However many of the clubs who did become involved have shown considerable membership increases with the tendency being for those clubs that became heavily involved in one year, not needing to do so the next year as their membership was completely full. It is still somewhat disappointing that some clubs which could really benefit from an increase in membership have chosen to do nothing. Furthermore it is still important even with a full membership to promote to current members and also to the public in an endeavour to increase the public awareness of squash as a racket sport and not just a popular drink that goes with gin.

Currently the biggest problem facing the N.Z.S.R.A. is to improve the standard and number of club courts available in the major population areas where it is harder to generate the community spirit to build new courts. This is a difficult problem to solve but the future possibility of New Zealand Squash Centre surplus funds being available for larger loans to clubs may help in this area.

Currently the number of affiliated squash rackets players is only slightly less than tennis affiliation numbers and approximately double those of other racket sports. Over and above this there are large numbers of others playing squash rackets on private courts, commercial centres and in schools, with the latter in particular being a growth area that must be encouraged.

One of our major aims is to increase the public awareness so that squash is recognised as a major racket sport with large numbers participating. In this area we continue to be very grateful to the media for the publicity we receive while emphasising that it is essential at all levels of squash administration to continually supply media outlets, including radio, newspapers and television with results and news worthy material. For the same reason the N.Z.S.R.A. promotes events such as the New Zealand Open which require some subsidy but provides the sport with a vehicle to ensure it obtains considerable publicity.

It is appropriate to mention Television New Zealand at this point, and in particular their television production crew led by Graeme Veitch, for the excellent level of technical expertise being provided in televised squash events. They are now generally recognised as world leaders in this area.

The success of our top players provides us with very important publicity and consequently as well as being proud of Susan Devoy and her recent exploits we are also very grateful of the publicity achieved by her which has enabled squash to maintain the high profile it achieved for the Pilkington World Championships last season.

COACHING TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT

As a result of a number of aspects the National Coaching Scheme was fully reviewed by Management, with the assistance of District Directors, following last years Annual General Meeting. No major policy changes were implemented from the review which was completed in May, as it was considered that the overall direction of the scheme and national programme was appropriate. There were however three significant changes made to the administration philosophy of coaching at national level.

- The first of these has been to increase the involvement
 of the N.Z.S.R.A. Management Committee in the
 coaching area so that they are more actively involved in
 the preparation of policy recommendations, by way of
 an executive coaching committee and hence have a greater
 commitment towards ensuring the implementation of
 approved policy. This has involved increasing the number
 of Management personnel on the Coaching Committee,
 placing Coaching higher on Management Committee
 priority and increasing the circulation of minutes,
 newsletters and other coaching correspondence generally.
- 2. The second aspect has been an attempt to create a situation where policy is formulated by a confirmation of District Directors and Management Committee personnel which is then administered by the National Coaching Director under the guidance of the Coaching Committee. Where this policy affects District activities, the intention is then not to "tell" Districts what to do but rather to ask them beforehand what they feel should be done and as to what assistance they consider needed from the National Body.
- 3. With the resignation of Bill McKenna, the fulltime National Coaching Director, in November last year, it was agreed to engage a new National Coaching Director in a part time capacity only. The position of Coaching Director has always been a difficult one with the problem being the interface between the paid Director and the amateur administrator whose responsibility is to ensure that things actually happen in each District, while still having commitments to his or her own fulltime employment in most cases.

To date these changes appear to be working well but we continue to require a commitment towards co-operation and ongoing communication between all levels.

COACHING AND DEVELOPMENT

NATIONAL DIRECTOR: Mr T. McQueen

1984 has seen the introduction of the International Development Group. With the naming of these players a very positive step towards top world ranking for New Zealand in the squash world was initiated.

The group consists of our existing world ranked professional players, our leading players resident in New Zealand as well as top junior players considered to have international potential. Other than the international players, all Group members now have their own Coach/Advisors and individually tailored programmes.

Three Junior Coaching Schools (National Squash Schools) were held in January. These schools catered for 120 promising young players selected from District nominations. The schools were a first for New Zealand squash, and proved a great success not only as a benefit to players but also to give coaches goals to aim for which is very important, if we are to continue to attract players into the coaching field.

UNDER 23 SQUASH COACHING

With the high drop out rate of top Juniors and the lack of true depth at top Senior level I feel that we must plan towards giving additional coaching and assistance to a select group in this area. Only players who are dedicated to advancing their squash should be considered.

COACHING OF COACHES

It is essential that we become more active in this area and the lead must come from national level. Recognising this already three national "Coaching of Coaches" weekends for top District Coaches were recently held during October and November of this year.

Following attendance at these clinics, coaches were to be encouraged to hold similar clinics within their own Districts while forward planning now provides for six national level clinics annually. The theme at the clinics held this year was "The Basic Game", including footwork, stroking technique, grip, and teaching players to think on court.

DEVELOPMENT

The importance of video in the promotion of squash is shown in the number of Districts who now own their own video equipment. The N.Z.S.R.A. holds an extensive library of both coaching and competitive tapes and these are readily available through the N.Z.S.R.A. Office.

Colin Brownlee has updated his version of "Introduction to Squash Training" and this is now readily available through the N.Z.S.R.A. Office. Also, his new book "Squash the Brownlee Way" which I'm sure will prove of value to coaches and players alike, is now due to be on the market.

C.A.N.Z.

The Coaching Association of New Zealand is planning a number of regional seminars during the 84/85 season and squash coaches are being encouraged to attend.

ADMINISTRATION

The high priority of coaching on the national scene was highlighted this year in the composition of a completely new look Coaching Committee and day to day administration is now being channelled through the N.Z.S.R.A. Office. The redirection is proving very successful, both in terms of economy and efficiency.

GENERAL

I would like to express my appreciation to the N.Z.S.R.A. Executive Director Bill Murphy and his staff, also to all District Directors of Coaching who have, by assistance given and advice offered, made my passage into the role of National Director of Coaching an easy one.

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PHYSICAL TRAINING

NATIONAL DIRECTOR

Rob Crothall

In commenting for this years Annual Report it is my intention to provide some notes for future development.

The Training Programme for the Mens and Womens 1985 World Championships Squads have already commenced. The women early in October and the men also, with a four day camp from 6 — 9 October, at which international players Stuart Davenport and Ross Norman attended. The Junior Girls Squad is also in training for their event which coincides with the Senior Women in Ireland in August next year.

We have had a feast of top squash in New Zealand in the last two seasons. Firstly with the 1983 I.S.R.F. Championships and the World Teams event, and secondly at the completion of our 1984 competitive season which included such highlights as the Womens Test Series and an excellent New Zealand Open.

It has been an enlightening time for our top coaches and myself because it has been a golden opportunity to scrutinise international players in action and compare our players and plays with them. I only make this comment after having spoken to Norman Coe and Dardir but the basic game and game tactics are unchanged. The ability of players to play the ball earlier has increased and it is quite noticeable that players in the ilk of Jahangir Khan move extremely quickly in the first movements from the centre court area which allows them to arrive at the ball early and perfectly balanced, to time their selected shot so that the ball is accurately placed away to the spot in the court they have chosen. The Australian Women are noted for their speed in which they try to regain the centre court position with their racket held up thus giving them as much advantage as possible. They used the front wall successfully, played very basic style which also eliminates errors.

Sports events can be categorised into four main groups for training. Group one houses the long distance events and weight lifting which all require extremes in the physical fitness components endurance and strength. Technique is simple and performance is largely improved by the amount of physical training. In group two fall all the events where maximum speed is the basis of performance i.e. sprints, hurdles and athletic field

events. Complex fitness is required with optimum technique. These need to be in perfect balance to achieve peak performances. Group three includes most ball games, all the racket sports and gymnastics. Very high technical and tactical skill are required with good physical fitness.

Sometimes inadequate physical condition will inhibit progress in a group where improvement in skill is unlimited. The fourth group is the target sport area where fine tuning is the main deciding factor. Certain specific fitness maybe required but this hardly affects final performance.

With our own grouping, and because technical skill and tactics play a vital part in performance, we need to practice and play all the year round. Essential physical conditioning needs to be developed particularly during preparation periods which is something we are trying to achieve with our top squads now.

I would like to think that in this country we could eliminate some of the off court work in favour of on court practising. Except for a small percentage of our top players there is simply not enough quality training carried out and this is apparent in our match play. On one hand we do not have the accurate skills to dictate the terms of a match and on the other we lack the confidence of our pattern and fitness and end up going for winners at the wrong time.

Activity at junior level is also back to front. Fun and enjoyment and wanting to play should be the best factors. Improving game skills and ball control should be syllabus items. Running and exercise programmes prior to 15 years of age are not worth the paper they are written on.

May I thank again all the people in squash I have had the pleasure of working with for another season and may I repeat again the final paragraph of my last years report — Players only make it to the top with a great deal of dedication and self sacrifice. Hours spent both on and off the court sometimes do not seem to measure up to the pleasures of winning and representing your country — but believe me they do.

TECHNICAL

Michael McCarthy (Convenor) Brian Callinan

Following the changes to the specifications of the Squash Racket parsed in 1983 and the removal of some of the import restrictions, players in New Zealand in the 1984 season have been deluged with many new rackets of differing construction materials and sizes.

The Association corresponded with the Sports Dealers Federation at the beginning of the year and has had further correspondence during the year with some importing companies, all enquiries dealing with the size regulations.

In mid season an oversize racket appeared in some shops and the advertising of the product drew attention to the fact that the racket had a bigger "sweet spot" giving the player more power.

This racket was clearly illegal under the current specification and would not be allowable in any competitions organised under the banner of the N.Z.S.R.A. and, in turn, the District Associations.

The Otago Squash Rackets Club completed an interesting technical challenge during the season. This was the replacement of a conventional plaster/block back wall with a glass wall. The feature of this replacement was that it was done to a central court between other courts of standard plaster walls and the final effect of this change has been most beneficial to the Club members, the viewing public and the media, especially local television. (This is the court featured on World of Sport with Dardir demonstrating basic skills and tactics.)

If established Clubs cannot see their way to add glass walled courts this would be a recommended alternative to enhance their club facility.

Management has been alert to the Ball adoption made in November 1983 and, in general, the two tier adoption has been well received by all players. Comment has been expressed that the English Ball has not required our younger players to be patient and be prepared to rally for longer to win points. The Ball is but one factor of the game of Squash Rackets and the skills and mental capacity of the players is an all vital part of their performance.

SELECTORIAL

Whilst the 1984 season has not been a demanding one as far as selecting teams is concerned the workload in a number of other areas has kept the Selectors on their toes throughout the year.

Our top players have performed with distinction around the world and in New Zealand, in particular we would like to congratulate Susan Devoy for winning the British Open, N.Z. National Championship, N.Z. Open, three Australian State Titles and achieving a World No. 1 Ranking, truely remarkable achievements unparalleled by any other New Zealander and an inspiration to all other squash players aspiring to reach the top. Also our congratulations to Ross Norman for his courageous recovery from his accident and coming back to win the N.Z. National Championship and the N.Z. Open, the determination of character Ross has shown in the last year must be nothing short of a miracle. Stuart Davenport's World Ranking of No. 3 is another notable achievement we should all be proud of, wouldn't it be great to have two New Zealanders ranked at Number One in the World — go to it Stu and Ross!

The examples by our leading players should be just that to our other nationally ranked Seniors and Juniors, now more than ever before they have the opportunities at their disposal to match and better these top performances.

One of these opportunities comes in the form of the International Development Programme (IDP) no doubt more fully detailed elsewhere in the Annual Report but its implementation should produce the top results we are looking for in the short and long term. The Selectors have had some input to the J.D.P. and will continue to work closely with the International Events and Tours Committee in this area.

The new coaching set up, under the expert care of Tom McQueen, is another very important avenue where our up and coming international prospects can benefit from. A recent top overseas competitor was heard to say we do too much for our players in New Zealand, hopefully our results to date and particularly in the future will prove this theory wrong.

The altered format to the Adidas Championship Series this year seems to have received wide acceptance. The new method of seeding these Tournaments i.e. using the current Seeding List, certainly saved the Selectors much time and expense but more importantly the players, we are sure, had a better idea where they stood from tournament to tournament.

The Selectors attended a fair number of Events on the National Circuit which enabled them to keep pace with competitors results and form which resulted in reasonably accurate seedings throughout the year.

As in the past the 1984 Ranking List is based on results over the preceeding twelve month period.

Now with the end of the 1984 season we look forward to the year ahead which will be a busy competitive one culminating in the selection of our Senior Women and Mens Teams to represent New Zealand at W.L.S.R.B. and I.S.R.F. World Championships in Ireland and Egypt respectively. We have recently reduced the size of both World Squads training for these events, we wish them every success in making the Teams and hope their hard work will be rewarding.

REFEREEING

NATIONAL DIRECTOR: Mr Dennis Winch

Following the high interest and activity associated with the 1983 World Squash Championships it was inevitable that there would be a comparative hiatus in the refereeing field for 1984.

The planned emphasis for the year was to be at District level and while this proved successful in some Districts there was and still is considerable room for improvement.

There were several important milestones in the year and it is hoped that full advantage will be able to eventually accrue from these. The publishing of the National Refereeing Scheme was finally achieved and distributed to Districts and Clubs. It is hoped that this will be of particular benefit at those levels and will aid the development of a stronger refereeing structure in the lower grades.

The continuation of the Trans-Tasman exchange saw two Referees attend the 1984 Australian Championships and have some limited discussion with Australian Refereeing personnel. It was pleasing to record that the two Australian finalists opted for New Zealand representative John Haines as their Referee in preference to any of the Australians present. The system we have in New Zealand and the general standard of Refereeing here would appear to be of a higher standard than observed at the Australian Championships.

Also during the year, we have had considerable activity in relation to a planned rewriting of the Rules of Squash to tidy up loose ends, formalise some of the taken-for-granted occurrences, and in general review the problem areas. The National Director has been directly involved as a member of the I.S.R.F. Technical sub-committee on Rules and I must record my appreciation of the assistance given during the year by not only the members of the National Examining Panel, the National Refereeing Committee and the District Directors, but also the input from those Referees and Players who became involved in discussions and trials throughout the year.

The awarding of the Derek Cook Memorial Trophy to John Taylor of Auckland recognised the great effort he made in the organisation of the refereeing for the World Championships as well as his general contribution to refereeing.

This year saw numerous changes of District Directors and with so many changes and relative inexperience it was pleasing to see the willingness that they all put into their tasks. I hope that they will stay on for another year to build on the 1984 effort and to help in the overall development of the refereeing scheme in New Zealand.

With the development of our Refereeing, there has been an increasing expectation to have qualified Referees and it appears that players are expecting higher and higher standards of the National and District Referees. This has led to a revision of the standards expected in the practical examinations for National Referee qualifications, the introduction of a two level District Referee grading and also a harder look at the list of National Referees, both active and inactive.

This year only two candidates were successful in passing the practical examinations and the main reason for the lack of further successes is the lack of exposure to top players with the subsequent lack of appreciation of the top players' abilities. It will require support from Districts in encouraging potential National Referees to travel to other venues if necessary to see regular top grade squash. This also is necessary for the qualified National Referees if they are to maintain their standing.

No longer can a National Referee, having achieved the qualification, sit back and expect to officiate at the "important" games, nor can they expect to stay a National Referee without developing a 'professional' attitude and accepting the responsibility that is part of the qualification. They must make every effort to be active and available with or without being asked.

I would like to record my sincere thanks for the support I have had in a year in which business pressure and travel restricted the time I was able to give Squash. Thanks to Peter Highsted for filling-in during my absence, to John Haines, Rod Hayes, Bruce Taylor and Warwick Stoupe in their various Committees, to the District Directors (which is often a thankless task), to those Referees who throughout the year have acted as Tournament Referees and the others who have turned up at the various Clubs all over the country to do their job. And a very big thanks to Bill Murphy without whom the Refereeing Directors job would be twice as difficult.

SPONSORSHIP

The advent of sponsorship into sport, not too many years ago on a major scale, has been reflected in squash over recent years and especially in the last 12 months. Probably every one of the 247 Clubs affiliated to the N.Z.S.R.A. benefit in one way or another from sponsorship provided by commercial companies and various enterprises in their own areas and this also applies with every one of the ten Districts that make up the New Zenland Association.

Squash has always taken a very positive attitude to sponsorship and the N.Z.S.R.A. is a firm believer that correctly implemented, it can be of significant benefit to the companies involved. Nonetheless this takes a considerable level of hard work and promotion by both the sponsoring company and the Clubs and Associations, and must be assiduously followed up by the organising committee of respective tournaments and solidly supported by all the players.

Overall, including the each contribution and the promotional support that has been put into the sport close on \$150,000 has been injected at national level by sponsors in the past season and the N.Z.S.R.A. acknowledges the above companies with special appreciation. In addition, and on behalf of all the Clubs and Districts special thanks are also conveyed to the many unnamed sponsors whom have assisted the sport at all levels throughout the past twelve months.

PLAYERS PRESENTATION



Tony Naughton, Players' Representative to N.Z.S.R.A. Management for past two seasons.

At the time of writing this report, I have just finished watching Susan Devoy and Ross Norman win the Honda City New Zealand Open at the Henderson courts on television. What a great day for N.Z. squash! Susan Devoy has repeated her magnificent British Open triumph over Lisa Opie and confirmed her No. I world ranking, whilst Ross Norman has climaxed one of the greatest comebacks in the history of N.Z. sport by knocking over (without dropping a game) three of the top 8 ranked players in the world, and to boot, they just happen to be Australians!

Generally, the television coverage for the Open and the Adidas finals have been excellent, and publicity for squash has gradually increased with Susan's British Open win giving the sport possibly its biggest boost ever in the country.

Sponsorship of tournaments has increased this year and for this, all players must thank N.Z.M.C. and Honda, Hertz, Slazenger and Adidas for their continued support. With the increasing sponsorship coming into the game, players must realise that they have a responsibility to promote the game and this is especially crucial in areas such as dress and court demeanour with particular reference here to attitudes to referees as shown on court.

Refereeing is a difficult job but some of the problems could be overcome with more discussion and communication between players and referees — one aspect of refereeing that players will not condone, however, is the examination of "student" referees at major domestic tournaments. A major innovation occurred in N.Z. squash this year and that was the introduction of the International Development Programme — a programme designed to improve New Zealand's international ranking for the future. Financial aid and coaching is provided for players who are ranked into categories ranging from our international players to promising youngsters, such as Glen Wilson, willing to try and make a career out of squash. This scheme has potential if implemented properly and we could see the results in the years to come.

Coaching has gone through a testing time this year but now with the appointment of Mr Tom McQueen as the Coaching Director, coaching will have a sound administrative framework from which to work. With coaching schools and national junior development squads working alongside the international development programme, juniors now have plenty of opportunities to progress in the sport if they so desire. Junior world championships are held every second year for boys and girls and with trips to Australia and Malaysia every other year, junior players have incentive to go out and put a lot into their training to achieve this overseas exposure which is so important. Congratulations here must go to 13 year old Glen Wilson for winning the Malaysian Under 16 title and Darrin Nichols for finishing third in the Under 18 age group - great prospects for the future but remember we must keep pace with the world's best juniors who at the moment reside in Australia in both boys and girls.

The only real issue to surface this year has been the split in prize money for men and women and after much heated discussion, a sub committee has been formed to investigate the issue and report back to Management in November. At the Players' meeting held at the National championships in Napier, which was very sparsely attended indicating either apathy or satisfaction at the way squash was going in N.Z., I resigned as Players' Representative due to family and business commitments and the new Players' Representative elected was Mr Hugh Leabourn along with Players' Committee consisting of Barrie Mathews, Steven Cleary, Sheryl Clarke and Gerry Getty. I wish Hugh and his committee all the best for the incoming year and hope that they learn as much about the administration side of the sport as I did. It was an educational experience attending the Management meetings and airing one's views, and I feel squash as a sport has very few problems as far as administrators communicating with players is concerned, especially when you look at the way other sports tackle or fail to tackle these issues - the avenue is there for players who have a gripe or a constructive suggestion to go through the Players' Representative to bring it to the attention of Management.

Finally, I would consider squash in N.Z. to be in a fairly healthy state but more emphasis must now be placed on making it an accepted sport at primary and secondary school level in order to get the grass roots support that any game so desperately needs as a solid foundation for future progress.

INTERNATIONAL SQUASH RACKETS FEDERATION

Bruce Davidson, I.S.R.F. Representative

1984 has proved to be a year of crucial development for the LS,R.F. The impact of having a full-time Executive Director has been evident, with improvement in all aspects of administration. Roger Eady has proved to be an excellent choice and has managed to carry out a difficult job very efficiently, and with a great deal of tact and diplomacy is proving very popular with all member countries.

One major development during the course of this year which could prove especially significant for the future of the sport is that Roger Eady is now also the Executive Secretary for the International Squash Players Association and is thus in a unique role in world sport, administering not only the interests of the world member countries but also the world's top professional players. Although some reservations were initially held about this dual role, it appears to work extremely well in practise and I.S.P.A. is now effectively meeting half the cost of the administrative office in Wales and the close liaison between the two bodies has meant enhanced communication and an almost total absence of any acrimony or disputes.

After the agreement in principle at the 1983 A.G.M. to change the status of membership and abolish the founder member concept and replace it with that of executive, full and provisional members, the constitution subcommittee (which included your representative) has worked continuously throughout the 12 months on the adoption of a new constitution for the I.S.R.F. Quite significant changes were agreed to the constitution, all of which should enhance the future running of the I.S.R.F. The new constitution has been adopted in such a way as to allow the proposed merger of the I.S.R.F. with the Womens I.S.R.F. which will in all likelihood proceed following the W.I.S.R.F. meeting in Ireland in 1985. The benefits of a combined international body are obvious and should ensure the continued development of our sport on an international basis for the benefit of both men and women.

This years Annual General Meeting which was held at Edinburgh, Scotland in early October was very successful and was attended by a notably high percentage of the 52 member countries. The following is a brief summary of the main items covered at the annual meeting:

1. Financial

This is one of the main areas of concern of the LS.R.F. with many countries not financial members and experiencing severe difficulty in paying their annual levy. The budget as submitted was approved but it was recognised that actual income may well be down on projected income and a great deal of urgent work has to be done to minimise the shortfall and endeavour to fund it from other sources. New Zealand's levy for 1985 is e\$3850.

2. The interim report from New Zealand on the 1983 Pilkington World Championships was received and a vote of thanks to New Zealand for the successful holding of the Championships was passed by acclamation. The general comment was that the 1983 Championships were considered to be clearly the finest ever held and have set a very high standard for future host countries.

3. Future World Championships

(a) The 1985 Men's Championships will be held in Egypt with the individual event being from 18 to 25 November and the teams events from 27 November to 7 December. The events will be spread over several venues in Cairo, and there appear to be sufficient courts and other facilities for the event to be completed successfully. As a direct result of the success of the individual event in New Zealand in 1983 discussions between the I.S.R.F. and the I.S.P.A. have led to agreement that the I.S.P.A. World Open Championship is now to be merged with the I.S.R.F. Individual Championship as The World Championship. The effect being that the I.S.P.A. World Open will, every second year, be now staged in conjunction with the I.S.R.F. World Teams Event, with the first such event to be held in Egypt in 1985. Preparations in Egypt seem well advanced.

- (b) 1985 Women's Championships: This event is to be sponsored by Seven Up and is to be held in Belfast and the surrounding areas. It will comprise four events including junior and senior individual, and teams and masters. The present period of the Championships is from 12 August to 8 September although in the light of concern expressed by member countries of the length of time involved there may be a reduction in this period.
- (c) 1987 Men's Championships: These will be held in England in October and based in London. A report was received and it is proposed to use a demountable clear view court possibly based in the Royal Albert Hall. The English S.R.A. obviously intends these championships to be a major success.
- (d) 1989 Men's Championships: Has been allocated provisionally to Singapore and Malaysia, but at the meeting Singapore advised that it wished to hold both the individual and teams event on its own. No decision has been made at this stage.
- (e) 1986 Junior Men's Championships: This event is to be held in Australia, either in Brisbane or Melbourne. The dates, being either April or September, have yet to be fixed but the meeting expressed to these preference for April.
- (i) 1968 Junior Men's Champlonships: To be held in Scotland following an application by that country at the meeting which was approved.
- 4. New Zeuland's Two Berrits to the meeting were both passed, one concerning an amendment to the World Teams eligibility rules and the other allowing the host country of the LS R.F. Championships to offer prize moties for the world team championships. The meeting also agreed to the Augustlan remit that prize money could be paid to competitors in the World Junior Championships.
- 5. The Swedish Remits that the LS.R.F. establish a world calendar of events where the responsibility for the dates of events is vested in the officers of the LS.R.F. was passed, and a substantial amount of work has been done by Roger Eady in endeavouring to establish such a world calendar. New Zealand's tournament dates have been submitted and approved and will form part of such a calendar.
- The concept of Masters Squash was again confirmed and as being applicable on the basis of five year age group categories for players 35 years and over. A set of rules

for such was adopted and it is intended to make the Internationl Masters a regular part of the I.S.R.F. Championships as soon as it is practicable.

- 7. An Approvals Scheme was discussed at length as a means of fund-raising for the LS.R.F. and was approved subject to there being no conflict with member countries and their individual arrangements. At present discussions are being held on an international approval for squash balls with a view to a return of all monies earned to members based on their percentage use of balls, with a clear understanding they are to be no worse off than under any present arrangements they have. This should help the funding of the I.S.R.F. and also assist members who are having difficulty in paying levies.
- The Rules of Squash: As a result of the substantial amount of work carried out by a special rules subcommittee a complete new set of rules was adopted, to be effective from 1 May 1985. Many quite substantial amendments were effected and our Rules and Refereeing Committee will make this a subject of a separate report. One major change supported by New Zealand was not adopted, and this was "the one serve game". After considerable discussion this was lost narrowly, however, it has been agreed that those countries that have not yet had a trial of this rule will do so in the next 12 months and the matter is to be considered again at the 1985 meeting in Egypt.
- World International Circuit: The American company ProServ, who successfully established the Volvo Grand Prix circuit for Tennis, submitted to the meeting a proposal concerning a world international circuit, which after considerable recasting was adopted.

As part of the proposal ProServ hopes to arrange a sponsor in the vicinity of \$US1,000,000 and to establish a world circuit to commence early in 1985, comprising initially, a minimum of 20 tournaments in at least 16 different countries.

Plans are for the sponsorship to be utilised for special promotion and advertising, with the I.S.R.F. to utilise the balance in hosting a special final for the circuit, and to assist contributing countries with their tournament expenses and prize money commitments. Each



participating country would continue to arrange its own sponsor as at present for its individual event, but would receive some assistance of a direct financial nature while achieving the overall benefits in participating in an established world circuit. The control of the circuit is to remain firmly vested with the I.S.R.F.

All existing member country tournaments that qualify would be guaranteed participation in the circuit and in this respect the New Zealand Open would definitely be a participating event. The proposal is a very exciting one and although not finalised at this stage there appears an excellent chance that it will proceed with ProServ already having several interested sponsors.

In conclusion therefore, the I.S.R.F. has had a very active and progressive 12 months and the stage is set for a very exciting period in world squash.

WOMENS INTERNATIONAL SQUASH RACKETS FEDERATION

Mrs Susie Simcock (Vice Chairman & N.Z.S.R.A. Representative)

At the General Meeting held in Perth last year the W.I.S.R.F. agreed in principle to the amalgamation of the W.I.S.R.F. with the I.S.R.F. to take place in 1985. Since then the liaison committee has been considering the means by which changes to the constitution could effect the amalgamation of the two Federations in a form agreeable to both parties, and preparing a formal proposal. Discussions continued at the I.S.R.F. meeting recently held in Scotland at which the W.I.S.R.F. Chairman and other representatives were present.

The Women's Squash Players Association (W.S.P.A.) was formally constituted earlier in the year. This is a progressive development with Robyn Blackwood, elected W.S.P.A. Chairman and the resultant publishing of regular international computer ranking lists.

Efforts are being made by the W.I.S.R.F. to establish and maintain a close working relationship with W.S.P.A. To assist this Robyn has been co-opted to the liaison committee of the W.I.S.R.F.

The next Womens World Championships, including a Junior Womens Individual and Teams event, will be held in Ulster, Ireland between August 12 and September 8, 1985. The Masters events will be held in Canada during the Masters Games at a similar time.

After Ireland — remember it is New Zealand in 1987 . . . a very exciting prospect. A real challenge to us all to match our No. 1 player with the No. 1 event in her own country.

WOMENS SQUASH

What an excellent year it has been for Women's Squash, starting with Susan Devoy's win in the British Open, making her the number one Women Squash player in the World.

Susan has undoubtedly brought Womens' Squash to the forc in New Zealand and has started the promotion wheels of the N.Z.S.R.A. turning faster, The Association is keen to promote Susan in as many parts of New Zealand as possible.

We have had an excellent coverage both by the news media and television and this we hope will turn a few more feminine heads to squash,

New Zealand can feel very proud in having two of our women in the top ten in the world.

Accordingly we should not overlook the number nine player in the world, Robyn Blackwood, who has also contributed to the administration side of world squash by becoming chairwoman of the recently formed Womens' Squash Player Association.

The Association was formed and officially constituted on February 26th, 1984 at the Irish Open Championships.

The Executive Committee consists of Chairwoman, Robyn Blackwood, Sec/Treas. Rae Anderson (Australia), then there is Sue Cogswell (England), Rhonda Thorne (Australia), and Heather Wallace (Scotland). They now have the task of keeping Womens' Professional Squash moving in a positive direction. Already there are definite plans afoot.

These include:-

- A To work as a recognised body to co-ordinate professional players rankings and tournaments in conjunction with existing governing bodies.
- B To liaise with and promote the interest if its members in conjunction with all national squash rackets associations and the W.I.S.R.F.
- C To further the development of a Womens' International Squash Tournament Circuit.
- D To endeavour to promote the position and status of its members in respect of promotion and other squash related interests.

And what about Susie Simcock?

Susie is vice chairwoman of the Women's International Squash Rackets Federation, whose function is to promote and organise the Womens' World Championships and to generally promote the welfare of the Womens' game and act as a liaison body. They are presently negotiating the possibility of amalgamating with the LS.R.F.

Susie is also an excellent manageress and ambassador for our country.

On N.Z.S.R.A. Management this year we have four women representatives which is the most there has ever been. The representatives are Carol Gardner, Northland District delegate, Sue Purdie, Auckland District delegate, Heather Simpson, Southern Districts delegate, and of course the most important woman in Junior squash, Lois Smith, who is the National Director.

We should also not lose sight of the fact that we also have many other women prominent in the administration field of squash. For example, we have Trish Lee who has for many years been a national Selector and the National Director of Statisticians. Wilma Halling, who is not directly connected to N.Z. Management, but who has contributed in respect to being the Secretary for the World championships in 1983, and the Honda City N.Z. Open held at Henderson Squash Club this year.

We have women in positions as Presidents of Clubs, coaches, and referees, who are pulling their weight in the world of squash.

A few more women on New Zealand Management would not go amiss.

What of the controversy this year over prize money?

Thanks to Susan Devoy being No. 1 in the world, this might now be remedied.

We are told there is not enough depth in Womens' Squash for this to be viable. Hopefully with the introduction of the international Development Squad, and more coaching for individual players, this will in the future, not be an issue.

Maybe the solution is equal prize money for equal players. However, one way or another, I am sure this will be settled by the end of the 1984 Season.

Women play such an important part in the development of the every day, social, and junior players. Let's keep up the good work by putting our names forward for coaching and refereeing positions to foster better players and referees throughout the grades.

We must give our thanks to our Sponsors over the 1984 Season, especially Honda for their contributions to our top women.


New Zealand will be hosting the 1937 Womens' World Championships, so here is incentive for all women to get in there and improve your status.

STATISTICIANS AND GRADING



MEN: Director - Gower Dallimore

The year under review has proved to be challenging for the grading undustry. In spite of the demonstrable improvement in the standard of many graded players and with real evidence that the country is coming out of membership recession we must not ignore the present high level of ungraded club members and commercial court players. These people are the perimeter of our system and we must stimulate interest and competition to encourage these players to be promoted into gradings.

No single issue distinguishes the ethical from the unethical in our profession more than the unsavoury matter of grading piracy. It would be a pleasant duty to be able to report that in these happy times all clubs should show their maturity and integrity by a downturn in the incidence of piracy. Regrettably no such assurance can be given and it is apparent that in the competitive arena of national teams events certain policy seems to be "to obtain a national title at whatever the price in grading ethics". People within the statistical field are amongst the most sensitive of all who work in service for our sport and I suspect in some cases the very people who are loud in their cries for a loftier image within their club are amongst those who stoop to conquer their competitives by any means, fair or foul.

It gives me great pleasure in congratulating two Districts for their achievements during the 1984 season: Central for winning the Junior Inter-District Teams title and Wellington for the introduction of their computer grading system.

It has long been accepted that the introduction of computerised gradings is inevitable in the next few years. Today's statisticians have probably gone through the worst of times and survived to learn that the people involved in grading work are the best. They are deserving of the best, most up-to-date and relevant methods available. Strides have been made and we can, with some justification, hold our heads higher and in future offer our services to the players in the knowledge that we are more capable and better equipped to meet the demands of today more than we were in yesteryear. There is no room for complacency however, as there is still a long way to go with the advent of new technology and persistent outside pressures and if we fail to inform our players about this then we can expect no immediate benefit, if at all.

I applaud Central for one of their better seasons with their junior team winning their District's first ever inter-district title and in the graded team finals, Central club teams finished third in F Grade, 4th in B Grade and 5th in C Grade. The competitive season was again dominated by Auckland and Waikato, however honours were fairly widespread throughout the remaining districts.

This season has been notable for the improvement in the gradings of the younger players. There are 24 players including six juniors under 23 years of age now holding an 'A' grading.

The year 1984 marks the end of my term as your National Director and I wish to record my sincere thanks and appreciation to all squash players for affording me such a great honour. Similarly I would like to thank all my colleagues, namely the district and club statisticians, delegates, district secretaries and committee members who have so willingly given their time to our cause. I would also record my appreciation of the loyalty and co-operation of the New Zealand Management Committee.

WOMEN: Director - Trish Lee

During 1984, our National Grading system has been the subject of interest from squash associations in Scotland and South Africa. Both these countries have been supplied with information to enable them to evaluate our system.

The system as it presently stands works well, however, we must not be complacent as there is always room for improvement. On this subject, the hoped for implementation of computer gradings nationally did not eventuate during the 1984 season. This was mainly due to the high cost factor involved and the fact that most Districts could not see their way clear to participate at this point in time. One District however, Wellington, did commence computer gradings during the year. The Wellington lists met with mixed reactions from players and some 'bugs' in the system did cause problems. Hopefully these have now been rectified and much interest will be shown in their system during 1985.

Grading list dates that were effective for 1984 appeared to work well. Concern has been expressed from some quarters with respect to the timing of the August list at which time many players competing in National Graded Teams event finals have

been re-graded. This area will be the subject of discussion amongst District Statisticians early next year.

During the past few years a District Statisticians meeting has been held during the A.G.M. in November. This year no such meeting will be held. In lieu of the November meeting, it was felt more appropriate that District Statisticians meet during the March N.Z. Management meeting at which time forward planning for the complete year can take place.

By March the new District Statisticians will have been appointed which should ensure a full complement of personnel and mean that every District is represented for this all important meeting.

The numbers of players within the various gendes has altered very little since last year, although it is very pleasing to note the continued improvement of our junior girls who are climbing higher in the grades with each new list.

Our grading system continues to be a very big job for the various people involved and I thank all District Statisticians for their work during 1984 and also their support to me in my role as National Director it is good to see such enthusiasm from voluntary workers.

ROBERT SPENCER MITCHELL (deceased 1964)



Probably not heard of by many modern era squash players, Robert Spencer Mitchell (Roy Mitchell as he was known to his friends) the first Life Member elected by the N.Z.S.R.A. died 20 years ago this year, at the age of 81, but during his lifetime and ever since has provided New Zealand Squash with a lasting bequest.

It is this bequest that makes it an appropriate time to reflect on this much respected gentleman whose name is linked with the Mitchell Cup and the Mitchell Rose Bowl, two major trophies he donated for Womens competition, and competed for in the premier Open Club event and the National Womens Championship respectively.

Roy Mitchell's bequest to the N.Z.S.R.A. included leaving \$400 annually to the Association from his estate from the time of his death in 1964. He requested that the money be used for the purpose of promotion and/or assisting travelling of New Zealand players to overseas tournaments and to overseas players to similar tournaments in New Zealand and tours by New Zealand players. His Will further required that on the passing of Mrs Mitchell, the N.Z.S.R.A. benefited to the extent of all the income arising from his estate "for developing, promoting and encouraging of the game of Squash in New Zealand". Under the terms of his will this income is available for the following period.

"during the lifetime of her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and during the lifetime of any child of her Majesty born during the lifetime of the testator (Roy Mitchell) and for the period of 21 years after the death of such last surviving child of her Majesty born during my lifetime (Roy Mitchell) and for such further period (if any) and should be allowed by law."

It is calculated that this period of time, given normal circumstances, will be for another 50 years and probably longer. As will be seen from this years annual accounts the yearly amount from now on should be in the vicinity of \$11,000. Based on today's economy this should mean at least half a million dollars in due course.

In the 1966 New Zealand Championship programme, the late Roy Haddon who himself was only the second person to be elected a Life Member of the Association, wrote:

"Roy Mitchell endeared himself to all keen followers of the game and we shall miss his lively interest in our welfare. Typical of his practical interest is what will be a considerable bequest for us to use for the promotion of the game and in particular to encourage Juniors and travelling teams."

Roy Mitchell who farmed at Weston, a small town a few miles inland from Oamaru, was a keen tennis and badminton player who on his retirement to Oamaru in 1934 decided to foster interest in squash, and also badminton, amongst young people. That year, with Messrs McDougall and Main, and others, he was instrumental in forming the Oamaru Squash Club using premises which were previously the Bank of New Zealand. He helped finance the Oamaru Club as well as badminton facilities in Mitchell Hall in Oamaru. The Oamaru Squash Court was one of the earliest "open" courts in New Zealand, the first being initiated in Timaru in 1933.


Roy Mitchell did not reach any great heights as a player yet the mere fact that he played the game was noteworthy in itself as he lost his left arm in action during World War I. Notwithstanding this he enjoyed a lively interest in the sport which led to his administration era, culminating in President and ultimately Life Membership of the New Zealand Squash Rackets Association.

The N.Z.S.R.A. was first incorporated in 1939 but following a recess during the Second World War the first recorded Annual General Meeting took place in 1946 and Roy Mitchell was elected a Vice-President under the then President Mr G.E.F. Kingscote. Mr Kingscote retired the following year on account of illness and Roy Mitchell became President. After 17 years in office, a record that will undoubtedly stand forever under modern day conditions, he actually tendered his resignation to the 1964 Annual General Meeting at Palmerston North. As it transpired the members at that meeting on the Saturday, which was also Roy's 81st birthday, felt that it was merely a gesture on his behalf because he was unable to attend the meeting and did not accept his resignation. Consequently he remained in office until he died a few months later. It is noticeable from the information available on Roy Mitchell that while he had no family of his own, he had the promotion of Junior players uppermost in his mind. Therefore it was significant to note that at that same 1964 A.G.M. the meeting approved the holding of the first Junior Age Group tournament under the Association's auspices. This was apparently not a straight forward decision and the naming of the tournament was such that the promoters could not include New Zealand in the name but the Association did give permission to its affiliated junior players to participate. One of the New Zealand Vice-Presidents at the time who was against the decision was publicly quoted as saying "Squash is not for children and we do not want them around our courts."

Fortunately, thanks to people like Roy Mitchell and the more positive members of that meeting, the game has never looked back.

It will be seen from this short summary that Roy Mitchell, the man who was known as the "reluctant Chairman" as he used to hand over the reigns as quickly as possible during the course of any meeting to a Vice-President, and as a person who enjoyed his whisky to the extent that he always carried his own glass straw to drink it through, has had a very significant impact on squash in New Zealand.

Many players in the past have, but especially those in the future will now benefit in many ways from the deeds of Robert Spencer Mitchell.

COMPETITIVE SQUASH 1984



Ross Norman, tired but very pleased with himself after a tremendous victory in the Honda City NZ Open Final and capping off a magnificient return to competitive play in New Zealand.

Following last years successful World Championships held in New Zealand it was difficult to envisage the 1984 competitive season reaching similar heights of interest yet the outstanding success of Susan Devoy with her British Open win as well as a stimulating tournament season for New Zealand players culminating in the best ever New Zealand Open, resulted in a truly momentus year.

While the New Zealand tournament scene was essentially structured on the format used in recent years, significant streamlining took place in certain areas including the tendering of the North Island and South Island Championships, a modified format for the Adidas Championships and the New Zealand Junior Age Group Championships being closed to New Zealanders for the first time. In addition the newly introduced International Development Programme saw the traditional Under 23 Internal Tour emphasis changed to a New Zealand Youth selection and the introduction of a tournament grading system akin to prize money levels appeared to add stimulus to the tournament circuit overall.

The season was underway in late March when the New Zealand Junior Teams departed for the World Championships in Calgary, Canada. Easter weekend saw the Slazenger N.Z. Under 23 Championships held at the Nelson S.R.C. and this was followed in May by the New Zealand Youth Team tour of the upper North Island. Hamilton S.R.C. hosted the North Island Championships on Queens Birthday Weekend and the Ashburton Club staged the South Island Championships later in June.

In its fourth successful year, the Adidas Championships involved all ten Districts in the Qualifying Series that ran through May, June and July with the Grand Finals at the Henderson S.R.C. in late August.

Early September saw the National Championships back in Napier at the Hawkes Bay S.R.C. for the first time in eleven years, including the Inter-District Teams event.

Immediately after the National Championships a strong Australian Womens Team toured New Zealand involving a three test series. The series led up to the highlight of the season, the Honda City New Zealand Squash Open at the television headquarters of squash, the Henderson S.R.C.

Masters Squash continued its popular surge with an historical inaugural Masters Test Series between Australia and New Zealand held at the Gold Coast, Queensland in September. The Hertz N.Z. Masters Squash Championships in their third season were hosted by the Palmerston North S.R.C. on Labour weekend.

Junior squash also engaged in a busy season and was fully active with the National circuit of four Championships, a number of Club and District tournaments as well as an interchange of Australian and New Zealand players at each countries respective Open Championships. In addition the New Zealand Junior Open held at the Whakatane S.R.C. in August included players from Canada and Singapore.

Over 500 tournaments were held throughout the year at Club and District level and Club entries were an all time high in the respective National Club Teams Championships. The Cousins Shield, Mitchell Cup competition was held at the Kawaroa Park S.R.C. with record entries in July with graded events competed for at District level in August with the National Finals in September.

While Susan Devoy predictably retained her number one ranking amongst the women, Ross Norman supplanted Stuart Davenport as the premier New Zealand male player and in doing so regained the number one ranking that he first held at the end of the 1982 season. Never having lost to Davenport in a major Championship event Norman always had certain claims to the number one position, and having recovered from his major accident which saw him off the competitive scene for the latter half of 1983, he presented the National Selectors with no other choice by convincingly winning the two major titles at stake in the country during the year.

Paul Viggers steadily improved his climb up the rankings to firmly establish himself as number three in New Zealand followed by a group of three young players in Danny McQueen (4), John Mills (5), and Anthony McMurtrie in 6th position. Of these rising stars the best performance perhaps has been John Mills from his 11th position in 1983. Nonetheless Under 23 Champion Danny McQueen has enjoyed a meteoric rise to number four position, coming from 8th last year and 14th in 1982. Coinciding with the rise of the young players has been the steady descent of seasoned competitors Rod Hayes, Neven Barbour and Craig Blackwood to where they now stand at seven, eight and nine respectively. While the lower places are jointly made up of steady players holding onto their rankings mixed with three young first time ranked players, Hugh Leabourn, Robert Wyatt and Stephen Cunningham.

Headed by Susan Devoy the top four women rankings remain identical to 1983. The next group from five to eight altered significantly however with Cheryl Te Kani improving from number eight to fifth slot closely attended by Judy Burgess, Robyn Hadfield and Jillian Oakley each of whom have lifted their placings after being ranked close to the bottom of the table last year.

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Similar to the mens situation, the year has seen the more seasoned campaigners amongst the women slip back. Notably former New Zealand Champions Jenny Webster from number five position to eleven and Pam Guy from ninth position to where she is no longer currently ranked having retired from competitive play earlier in the season. Jane Weir has also slipped off the rankings while inactive competitive seasons by Cheryl Clarke and Linda McClure have seen both players slide from their previously higher ranked positions.

Kay Collins in the meantime has improved her ranking from fifteenth spot to number ten while Veteran Susie Simcock has regained a position on the table along with Linda Gurteen and Carolyn Viggers, new entrants for the first time.

N.Z. SQUASH PERSONALITY OF THE YEAR

Victory in the British Open, a subsequent number one world ranking and New Zealand National and Open Championships titles made Susan Devoy the inevitable winner of the New Zealand Squash Personality of the Year Award.

Her performances excelled those of any New Zealand Squash player before her and without much doubt made her the top sportswoman in New Zealand for 1984. The finalists for the squash personality award besides Miss Devoy were Joanne Williams, for her performances in the National Championships, Stuart Davenport who reached number three in the world rankings during the year and Ross Norman, not only for his dual victories in the New Zealand National and Open Championships but also his magnificent recovery to full fitness following his major accident last year.

The award was presented at the Honda City New Zealand Open prize function and as an added achievement Miss Devoy now joins Bruce Brownlee as the only players to have received the award on two occasions.

VOGEL ROSE BOWL (Most Improved Male Player)

John Mills, former New Zealand Junior Representative who competed in the 1980 World Junior Championships in Sweden, and now ranked number five in New Zealand, won the award for the most improved male player of the year. Mills is a player who has always shown tremendous skill at the game and has potential to go a long way if he can achieve the necessary strength in his play. His best result in a successful season saw him reach the semi-finals of the National Championships.

AUSTRALIAN WOMENS CUP (Most Improved Female Player)

Tenacious Auckland Rep. Judy Burgess deservedly won the award for the most improved female player during the season. More often than not in the shadow of her more illustrious counterparts in the Auckland team, Judy Burgess has recorded some impressive victories during the year resulting in her New Zealand ranking lifting from twelve in 1983 to six for this season.

HONDA CITY NZ OPEN



In one of the greatest sporting comebacks in New Zealand's history, Ross Norman not only returned to international squash in 1984, after a career threatening injury, but achieved his best ever season. Shown here during the Honda City NZ Open final, at Henderson S.R.C., Norman's brilliant form resulted in him capturing the NZ National Championships, New Zealand Open, Spanish and West German titles within a space of ten weeks.

The National Associations determination to conduct a premier tournament catering for the top international players was justifiably rewarded by the level of competition at this year's championships. It could be claimed that the calibre of the mens and womens draws combined surpassed any previous tournament in New Zealand.

The success of Ross Norman and Susan Devoy provided top show pieces for the sport especially as the media coverage was extensive. For the first time in a tournament in New Zealand two matches were televised live and it is possible that the viewing audience for the women's final was the greatest ever for squash.

Norman displayed a brilliance that he has probably never surpassed and his victories over three Australians Ross Thorne, Dean Williams and Chris Dittmar, all ranked in the World's top 10, on successive days was a magnificent achievement. His speed, agility and touch were all contributing factors and his sustained pressure was too much as his vanquished opposition all conceded. The measure of Norman's superiority is demonstrated by the fact that in these matches he conceded only an aggregate of 25 points.

Dittmar had reached the finals at the expense of top seed Stuart Davenport who failed to achieve the same level he had shown in the 1983 Pilkington World Championships. Two Swedes Frederik Jonsson and Jan Sodderburg reached the quarters as did Singaporians Peter Hill and Zainal Abidin. While West German Ralf Schuldt and two promising young Englishmen, David Lloyd and Martin Bonemeade gave the men's draw a true international flavour.

It appeared that Susan Devoy was not at ease in the earlier rounds of the womens event after her earlier losses in the test series to Vicki Cardwell. However with the No. 1 seeding and Robyn Blackwood's subsequent meritorious quarter final victory over Jan Miller she eventually had little difficulty in reaching the final where her opponent was English No. 1 Lisa Opie. Miss Opie had not previously played in New Zealand and her victory over Vicki Cardwell in the semi-final was unexpectedly easy. Although Mrs Cardwell won the first game she was unable to cope with the English Woman's repertoire especially as she appeared to lack some of her usual agility. Although Susan Devoy prevailed in the final 4 games it seemed at times she would be unable to match Lisa Opie's range of strokes but the latter's impetuosity saw her play her attacking shots when the margin of error was too fine and this was probably the decisive factor. Robyn Blackwood's quarter final victory over Jan Miller was probably her best win for 12 months and could prove influential in her future career.

Of the other women competitors the 19 year old Queenslander Liz Irving impressed as one who is likely to make rapid progress in the world rankings by her defeat of the 7th seed the experienced Carin Clonda and the manner in which she was able to push Vicki Cardwell in a tight quarter final match lasting four games.


The support of the public saw the galleries full for all the important matches which was a tribute to the players, the tournament officials and the Henderson facilities.

ADIDAS NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS

For the third time Napier hosted the New Zealand National Championships and the tournament programme produced by the Hawkes Bay Club included an article which demonstrated the contrast between the facilities provided in 1959 in the 'reservoir' and the modern complex with a glass backed gallery court which was the scene of all major matches in this year's event.

Ross Norman and Susan Devoy each, predictably, won the national title for the second occasion and their presence, performances and personalities provided an essential tone that ensured the 1984 champions were worthy title holders.

Admittedly they outclasses all opponents but their level put the abilities of their opponents into perspective.

Joanne Williams and Paul Viggers were their respective final opponents and Williams' semi-final victory over Robyn Blackwood was probably the most significant in her career and which perhaps encouraged her to consider that she had reached a peak which she could not surpass. The Taihape player gained her victory over Blackwood the hard way as she lost the first two games and it seemed that the former champion's more attacking approach and severity in her shots would enable her to retain her ascendancy. However, Williams' tenacity under pressure enabled her to dominate the third and level at 2 all and then take control in the 5th. In the final Devoy started at a great pace and raced through the first two games in little more than 10 minutes but as she afterwards conceeded she she had not paced herself. This enabled Williams to settle into a pattern in the third game which she won but in the 4th game she struggled throughout.

Donna Gurran was the other losing semi-finalist and in doing so provided little opposition to the champion although she did have some periods of relative equality.

In the Women's contest the quarter-finalists were as the seedings predicted but none of the beaten players ever looked likely to cause a surprise and neither was there any real evidence of an emerging star.

Viggers did not drop a game in his path to the mens final although Danny McQueen pressed him at times in the semi-final match. John Mills reached the semi-finals for the first time after a 5 game see-saw quarter-final struggle with Anthony McMartrie.

Viggers realistically considered he had no prospect of defeating Norman, as he lacked the edge to make a contest of it with a world class opponent; inevitably found that Norman's all court dominance put him under too much pressure although he tried valiantly at all times.

Rod Hayes and Neven Barbour represented the more experienced group and both made the quarter finals with Barbour doing so for the 13th time since 1972 which is probably a unique achievement.

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ADIDAS CHAMPIONSHIPS

Susan Devoy and Paul Viggers proved popular and deserving winners of the 1984 Adidas Championships.

Viggers had his first win in the event while for Susan Devoy it was the second year in succession that she had won the title.

Viggers had little difficulty in any match during the finals at Henderson S.R.C., winning all his tussles in straight games while only dropping eight points against John Mills in the final.

Likewise Susan Devoy did not lose a game during the entire finals weekend winning her four matches with considerable case and despatching the previous title holder Robyn Blackwood convincingly in the final.

Whereas Viggers is the fourth mens title holder in as many years since the event was inaugurated the Womens Championships have been equally shared between Robyn Blackwood and Susan Devoy.

A review of the format for the Championships prior to the season starting resulted in a number of significant changes which were generally well accepted throughout the year. The qualifying events were points graded in relation to the prize money offering and the players qualifying in the top eight positions received qualifying prize money as against the previous bonus system.

The victory by Nancarrow was more significant as the year went on as he won the Queensland Championships followed by a surprise victory in the Australian Open.


Nancarrows victory at the Otago S.R.C. was only the second by an overseas player in the South Island event, the previous time being when Ian Robinson from England won in 1974.

NEW ZEALAND SQUASH CENTRE REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 1984

This has been a most satisfactory year for the Centre as the accounts presented show. The year has been one basically of consolidation and completion of existing facilities with quite significant capital improvements carried out.

During the course of the year a large new mens changing room and showers have been built and the upstairs toilets in the restaurant area have been completed. Both are myjor iroprovements to the Centre. Normal annual repairs and maintenance has been carried out to a year algh standard and the courts new provide a fine asset for the Association and an excellent show place for squash,

There is no question that the successful completion of the facilities and the continuing excellent financial results reflect the management and commitment of Nick Cass. Nick's capacity for work is astounding as is his continued interest and commitment to our Centre.

As can be seen from the accounts not only has there been a substantial increase in revenue from court fees, but also a continuing progression in development of the restaurant and in the sales and hire facilities from the retail shop. The shop is presently carrying extensive stock purchased at pre-devaluation prices which should assist figures in the forthcoming year in this area.

An interesting development this year has been the agreement reached with the New Zealand Foundation for the Blind Institute for the use of its two courts on the basis of a 50/50 profit share. (The Institute had purchased the former Wellington Commercial Travellers Club building which contained two squash courts). This has proved a useful complimentary addition to our number of courts and although the returns are modest they do assist peak booking problems.

The Centre is now developed to its full potential and any increase in its returns to the Association are likely to be minimal. If however the present level is maintained it is very satisfactory indeed and far exceeds any reasonable expectations held when the Centre was first acquired.

After 3 years of slightly declining membership, following the explosive boom of the 70's a healthy increase in membership has been recorded for the 1984 year. Club membership levels increased by 1822 (3.59%) and this added to the new Club membership of 1228 provided an all up increase of 3038 members, which represents a 6% increase on the 1983 membership.

Every District, with the exception of Midlands, increased its membership. Northland with 13.54% and Hawkes Bay / Gisborne with 12.40% had the largest increases, while Waikato, partly as a result of the Taumaranui S.R.C. transferring its affiliation from the Central Districts, also had a significant increase, of 9.77%. Other increases were Auckland 3.37%, Bay of Plenty 7.46%, Central 6.58%, Wellington 4.11%, Canterbury 6.81%, and Southern 5.19%. Midlands decrease represented 1.83%.

Junior membership has lifted by 10.99% including a 14.74% increase in the Junior Women compared with 8.74% in the Junior Men.

The Senior Womens membership has shown a similar trend, increasing by 6.86% against the Mens of 3.89%. Total Senior membership has increased by 5.06%.

As a result overall membership ratios now show Seniors comprising 83.87% and Juniors 16.12%. Male players represent 62.19% and Female players 37.81%.

AUSTRALIAN WOMENS TOUR OF NEW ZEALAND

As part of the Tasman Exchange agreement between the Australian and New Zealand Associations, an Australian Womens Team toured New Zealand in September for the three Test Honda Women's Series, as well as competing in the Honda City New Zealand Open.

With Susan Devoy's successes during the year the Test Series created a tremendous public interest, especially the encounters between Devoy and Vicki Cardwell the World Champion who lead the Australian Team.

It was Cardwell's first appearance out of Australia since early 1983 and since her victory in the World Championships in Perth later that year.

It was the first occasion that a Test Series had been sponsored in New Zenland or Australia with the provision of prizemoney and probably the first occasion in World Squash. Large galleries attended all Test venues where the main drawcard was the enthralling bartles between Susan Devoy and Vicki Cardwell.

It was the strongest New Zealand team ever fielded on paper yet once again the Australian players proved that match fitness and quart speed are two essential ingredients for International squash. With the exception of Susan Devoy's victory over Vicki Cardwell in the 1st fest at Dunedin Australia made a clean sweep of the Series.

With her classic victory in the first Test Susan Devoy was favourite to win her next encounter with Vicki Cardwell in the 2nd Test at Khandallah, but after a brilliant exhibition of world class and sometimes bruising squash by both players, Vicki Cardwell ran out the winner in the fifth game involving 110 inhuites of tension packed play.

The third Test proved to be an anti climax when Vicki Cardwell soundly defeated a tired Susan Devoy in three straight games. Robyn Blackwood found the speed an agility of Jan Miller too much in all three Tests although she showed encouraging form in the third match where she started to regain some of her International standing of eighteen months previous.

While playing some of the best squash of her career prior to the Test Series Joanne Williams had no answer to the speed of Mary Jo Reid in any of her three matches.

As a promotion for squash the series proved very successful and although it was convincingly won by the Australian Team, interest remained high throughout and all matches were played before packed galleries. The New Zealand Team Manager Susie Simcock summed up the Series by commenting that while New Zealand lost, the opportunity to play the Australians in New Zealand was invaluable and provided an excellent yard stick and reminder for what had to be achieved for any success in next year's World Championships in Ireland.

20 — 22 July

This years event hosted for the first time at Kawaroa Park S.R.C. was notable for a record entry in the Cousins Shield and the appearance of four new Clubs in the competitions. These included Kawaroa Park, Linwood, Wanganui and Otaki, as well Palmerston North made a welcome reappearance after a number of years in the wilderness from this supremacy event for top clubs.

As a fitting climax both the Mens and Womens events provided new champions. Geyser City, with probably the youngest mens team ever, justified their top seeding to boating defending champions Hamilton in the final and providing the first victory by a provincial city club for 20 years since Tenara's victory in 1964. Hamilton, in winning the Mitchell Cup regain for their club a title which they last held in 1963.

Comprising what was virtually the Bay of Pleary representative team at the National Championships held later on the year, Geyser City had little trouble reaching the rinal cossing aside Remuera and North Shore 5-0 in both their early round encounters. Although Hamilton provided much stiffer competition a fifth set win by Danny McQuecasara, Authory McMurtrie, a convincing three straight victory by Robert Wyatt over Paul Devoy and a tense five set in which Phil Wallace bent the much improved Simon Menzies, saw a mentorious win clinched for the Sulphur City Club

In the Mitchell Cup event, Hamilton with a virtual replica of the Waikato representative team, hed by World Ranked No. 1 Susan Devoy, carved a similar road to the file as the Geyser City Mens Teams. They comfortably deposed of new entrant Kawaroa Park in the first round and the tenacious Managewa Club in the semi-finals. The second semi-finals however saw a much closer encounter between traditional roads Remoers and defending champions North Suore. Remoera won an excelling tussle three matches to two to avail to their loss in last years final to their Auckland counterparts.

While the score line in the final ended in favour of Hamilton three of the matches were very close, but convincing winy by Susan Devoy and veteran Jane Weir clinched victory for Hamilton to end an eight year domination of the event by Auckland Clubs,







MASTERS SQUASH

NEW ZEALAND TOURNAMENT SCENE

This year has again seen many successful Masters tournaments.

Unfortunately however, some of the District events were poorly patronised and consideration could well be given to the concept of fewer tournaments serving larger areas.

Perhaps New Zealand could be divided into four areas as follows:-

Upper Northern......(Auckland and North Auckland)
Middle Northern......(Waikato and Bay of Plenty)
Lower Northern.(Wellington, Central Districts and Nelson)
Southern.............(Rest of the South Island)

In addition a North and South Island Masters Championship could be held, thus making six major Masters Tournaments in the course of the year apart from the National Masters Championship.

This concept obviously merits discussion and if it finds acceptance with the sponsors, it could also lead to the staging of area team events to be held in conjunction with the national titles on Labour weekend, similar to the interstate teams events in Australia.

MASTERS INTERCLUB

Masters interclub is well established in some areas but is not as widespread as could be desired.

Once again we have a numbers problem. One format used in Australia is worthy of consideration.

Anyone over 35 years of age is eligible and the playing order within each team of four players is decided on merit. The teams can be mixed so that a woman may play another woman or a man of similar ability.

Clubs of course can enter more than one team depending on the number of players available.

FUNDING OF MASTERS SQUASH

There is strong feeling amongst players that Masters should now be recognised as an integral part of squash from the point of view of official funding and support.

Masters squash has been the biggest growth area in recent times with the consequent generation of extra funds and players feel that they are entitled to their fair share.

Considerations of funding and travel costs may also be of primary consideration in deciding on venues for the National Championships. It may be more attractive to visiting teams if the venue is close to seemic areas but it would certainly be easier and less expensive for us to field the strongest possible team against the visiting Australians if the venue is in the Northern or Central part of the North Island.

INTERNATIONAL SCENE

International Masters Squash came of age in September of this year with the staging of the first official Australia vs New Zealand test series at All Sports Squash Centre in Surfers Paradise.

The test team of six men; Bruce Bark (over 35) Richard Purser (over 40) Peter Worrall (over 45) Larry O'Neill (over 50) Arthur Wright (over 55) Ash Andrews (over 60) with reserve Ken Turnbull and four women: Kay Glenny (over 35) Annette Andrews (over 40) Gillian Roberts (over 45) Marge Bowers (over 50). It was also accompanied by a group of 25 supporters led by Gower Daillimore.

The tour was a great success in all respects except test wise, in that we suffered a resounding defeat going down 8 matches to 2 in the two test rubbers that were played. The Australians obviously took this occasion seriously and fielded a very strong team.

Ron Ansell, the President of the Australian Masters Squash Racket Association had a handsome trophy made for the occasion and made a firm commitment to bring an Australian team over here next year despite the counter attraction of the Masters Games in Toronto.

It is obviously important that there is now a firm commitment to ensure that the necessary funding is available to ensure that we field our best possible team both home and away on future occasions.

INTERNATIONAL MASTERS STEERING COMMITTEE

Another important milestone was the acceptance of the National Co-ordinator's proposal to form an International Masters Committee, in the course of attending the A.G.M. of the Australian Masters Association.

The Committee, headed by Ron Ansell, will have the responsibility of establishing contact with key personnel overseas, and of compiling an International Masters grading list.

It is hoped that this will lead to co-ordination of Masters events so that trips and holidays can be planned with a view to competing in various overseas tournaments.

Eventually it is hoped to compile an International Masters Squash calendar for each year and to develop Masters Squash Circuits in Eastern, Pacific and European countries.

Finally I wish to express appreciation for the continued generous sponsorship provided by Hertz and for the support and help provided by Warwick Stoupe as the official Masters representative on Management and by the Executive Director and other Association personnel.



The National Under 23 programme continued in similar format as in recent years comprising the Slazenger N.Z. Under 23 Championships and an Internal tour.

The Slazenger N.Z. Under 23 Championships were successfully held at Easter weekend by the Nelson Squash Club under the guidance of Tournament Director John Wesney. The total of 54 entries was a little disappointing for the Host Club especially after the record 93 the previous year, nevertheless the high calibre of the entries made up for the lack of numbers. There were 114 matches played during the weekend with many competitors playing 6 matches which makes an event like this very worthwhile.

Danny McQueen successfully defended his mens title against John Mills while Donna Gurran defeated Jillian Oakley to take the womens title. The winners prize was free travel to both the North and South Island Championships, but neither winner fully utilized their prize fully. The N.Z.S.R.A. must now consider the reward for future winners as they will almost certainly be members of the International Development Group who will already be receiving assistance to major events.

NATIONAL DIRECTOR OF JUNIOR SQUASH

Having recently watched Susan Devoy and Ross Normans' impressive wins in the 1984 Mens and Womens Honda City New Zealand Open Championships, my thoughts go back to when they both won their National Under 13 Championships and every other Junior Title after that. It makes, I hope, all of us realise how important the handling of our Junior players, and their programmes nationally and internationally, is to the future of New Zealand Squash.

NATIONAL

The 1984 Junior season started at Masterton with the Slazenger North Edund Junior Championships. It was a pleasure to have the N.Z.S.R.A. President present on the final day and it was notable that this was the first time for seven years that a President has been able to fit a Junior National event into a heavy schedule.

The Slazenger South Island Championships were held at Timaru, which was an indication of the improvement and growth of Junior Squash in the Midlands Districts since it became the third District in the South Island in 1983.

The Slazenger N.Z. Age Group Championships held in Christchurch in July had two notable firsts connected with the event this year. It was the first time the event had been for New Zealand players only and it was the first time the event had been held in the South Island.

The Slazenger N.Z. Open held in Whakatane during the August school holidays included two boys and two girls from Australia, as part of the Tasman Exchange agreement, a boy and a girl from Singapore and one boy from Canada which gave a truly International aspect to the tournament and extra competition

for our players. The Boys title went to Canada and the Girls to Singapore.

The Inter-District Teams Event which followed the Open reverted back to a full round robin to the satisfaction of all who participated.

None of these Junior National Events would have been held if it had not been for the support of the host clubs concerned and the expertise of the Tournament Director who included Mrs Megan Paton at Masterton, Mr Wayne Penty at Timaru, Mr Jim Crosbie at Christchurch and Mr Peter Anderson at Whakatane. To these personnel and their many assistants; Thank You.

INTERNATIONAL

Our Junior Mens Team attended the 3rd I.S.R.F. Championships held in Calgary, Canada during April and included Mark Tapsell, Elliott Jones, Lance Cooper and Steven Wren. The Manager was John Anderson.

Although the results were not up to our expectations I would like to congratulate them all on their efforts and hope they benefit from the International experience for their future in the game.

Glen Wilson and Darrin Nicholls were able to accept the invitation to the Malaysian Junior Championships through the generosity of their District, Wellington, and their respective Clubs Maidstone and Otaki. Glen won the Under 16 Championships and Darrin was third in the Under 18 Championships.

As part of the Tasman Exchange agreement Justine Marriott and Marie Pearson attended the Australian Junior Open Championships. Both these players found the competition very strong, however, Marie Pearson won the Plate event.

The formation of the International Development Group hopefully will eventually alleviate many of our problems we have had with lack of depth in our International teams in the past.

SPONSORSHIP

Thank you to Slazengers N.Z. Ltd., who have once again supported New Zealand Junior Squash and a special thank you to their representatives who have taken such a knowledgeable interest at the National events.

Thank you also to the N.Z.S.R.A. for their assistance to three South Island players to the North Island Championships and three North Island players to the N.Z. Age Group Championships.

REFEREEING

Thank you to the referees who have officiated at the National Junior events, it has certainly been of great benefit, especially to the tournament organisers.

COACHING

The New Zealand Junior Development Squad attended a school in Wellington following the North Island Championships. Some of the original selected players were unable to attend due to work and other commitments, nevertheless players were added and those who attended benefitted greatly.

This coming year the National Squash Schools will again be held in January but with the nucleus being the nationally selected players and members of the International Development Group players, with any vacancies being taken by District nominees.

The New Zealand Junior Squash Committee feels very strongly that the N.Z.S.R.A. should only be coaching the top prospects who have come up through the system, to a standard where they are selected for New Zealand coaching and assistance.

The National Coach, Dardir el Bakary attended the Slazenger N.Z. Age Group Championships adding his usual charisma to the event.

SELECTORIAL

John Heinz (Convenor), Peter Hagan and John Anderson have attended all Junior National events and selected the following players and squads throughout the year.

- Squad of 6 girls to train up to a standard that they can represent New Zealand at the World Championships in Ireland in 1985.

As Director, I have attended the International Events and Tours Committee meetings and Coaching meetings and I feel that it is most important that the Junior Director is involved in these particular areas.

Thank you to Andrew Dolg, N.Z.S.R.A. President, Bill Murphy, Executive Director for his guidance, and all members of the N.Z.S.R.A. Management for their experience and their consideration during 1984.

The third Junior Mens World Championships were held in Calgary, Canada during April and New Zealand was represented with the following team:

The New Zealand Team was selected at the completion of the 1983 Slazenger New Zealand Junior Open Championships and this was followed by seven months intensive preparation prior to the team's departure in late March.

Whereas the previous Junior teams to the World Championships in Sweden (1980) and Singapore (1982) included nationally ranked players at Senior level this years team was made up of B Grade players only at the time of selection.

It was a creditable achievement therefore that all the four members improved their standard to A Grade by the time of departure, however, as was anticipated, their strength was still not such that they were able to seriously test the World's best.

In their qualifying pool matches against Sweden, Malaysia and Netherlands, New Zealand beat the latter two countries but narrowly lost to Sweden resulting in New Zealand progressing to the Intermediate pool stage with England, Pakistan and Finland in Pool A, while Australia, Canada, Scotland and Sweden contested a less stronger Pool B. While the team could not successfully encounter the strength of Pakistan or England, losing both ties 0-3, they beat Finland to finish 3rd in the Pool but out of contention for a placing in the top four.

Their next match which proved crucial, was against Scotland and again they found the opposition too strong going down 1-2 leaving New Zealand to play off for 7th and 8th position with Finland. In this New Zealand had little difficulty in repeating their earlier Pool victory against their opponents, to complete the Championships in 7th place.

Team Manager John Anderson summed up the Teams performance as follows:

"During the seven months preparation our first aim was to get what was basically a team of "B" graders up to an acceptable "A" grade standard. Going by the results of our last tournament before departure, it had appeared as though we had just achieved the aim. Even though the teams physical fitness level was externely high it was their lack of mental toughness at the International level which showed out. This was the difference between 5th and possibly 4th position, against the 7th we finished."

Prior to the Teams Events the World Junior Individual Championship was held and it was noticeable for its domination by the Australian players, six of whom made the last eight.

Mark Tapsell was the only New Zealand player to receive a seeding (No. 8) in the top 16 and from a draw which included 82 players New Zealand's best results were achieved by Lance Cooper and Steven Wren who progressed to the third round. The Championship was won by Australian Chris Robertson who beat Englishman David Lloyd in the final.

During the year ended 30 September 1984 no Special General Meetings were called. The following Constitutional changes, By-Law Amendments and Resolutions, etc. were passed at the 1983 Annual Meeting held in Rotorua on November 26.

CONSTITUTIONAL

- Timing of submission for Notices of Motions and General Remits that Rule 14 be amended to read:
 - (a) The Rules of the Association may be altered, repealed or replaced by a resolution of a three-fifths majority of the votes recorded by those present at any General Meeting. The notice calling it shall have specified the proposed alteration, repeal or substitution but nothing in these Rules shall prohibit the amendment at any General Meeting of any proposal which has been specified in the notice calling the meeting. Notice of any motion importing a change in the Rules shall be forwarded in writing to the Executive Director not later than sixty days before the date of the General Meeting, forty days notice of such proposed alteration to be given to all members.
 - (b) Notices of Motion for proposed changes to any By-Laws of the Association and any general remits shall be forwarded to the Executive Director not later than sixty days before the date of the General Meeting, forty days notice of such proposals to be given to all members.



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
