The Susan Devoy Foundation set up by New Zealand Squash in honour of the world's greatest female player and arguably the best sportswoman New Zealand has ever seen, has as its main purpose "the encouragement of young New Zealanders to participate in the sport of Squash". Squash in schools will become the main focus of the Foundation programme when underway.

The Susan Devoy Foundation Tournament billed to become the "biggest squash tournament on earth" will take place in March and will be open to all squash players. Graded and ungraded players will be able to participate and progress through to national finals later in the month.

The activity of the Foundation and the Tournament will be a long lasting tribute to Susan from all areas of New Zealand Squash.

EXECUTIVE COUNCIL REPORT

The 1993 year has brought in two major initiatives by the Executive Council. Early in the year the new High Performance Programme finalised, combining the Institute Programme with an enlarged coaching programme, aimed at continuing the development of our top players while ensuring that coaches at all levels, were given the opportunity to develop thoughout the country. Whilst some of the resource material is still being prepared, the assistance received from our Australian counterparts has enabled us to be well down the path to having the whole programme in place. The presentation of the programmes throughout the country have been very well received and has shown that New Zealand Squash now has in place a structured coaching system, that gives all involved in coaching a path along which to progress.

Twelve months ago, when work commenced on preparing a marketing plan, it became apparent that before such a plan could be prepared, we needed to ascertain our present position. To this end, a marketing survey was commissioned, and after visiting many clubs throughout the country, and obtaining comments from a wide range of people (including non-squash players), a comprehensive report with marketing recommendations was recently considered by Council. There are some critical points which arise which must be taken aboard by all levels of Squash management. Work is at present underway on developing a marketing plan, taking into account the results of the research and recommendations and there will at least be an outline of this plan available for presentation at the Annual Conference. The research was greeted very positively by all involved, and it is imperative for our future growth, that the results are heeded by squash managers throughout the country.

The Council met on eight occasions throughout the year, including a meeting with all District Presidents, mid year, and a working party has carried out a review of the refereeing programme. The workload undertaken by Council members certainly doesn't lessen, but they do feel that more is able to be achieved under this structure than was possible under the old management system, and although the year has been a busy one, all members of Council feel some satisfaction from the year's achievements.

During the year, our sport has again received considerable backing from the media with coverage at all levels. The assistance of all the media personnel concerned is greatly appreciated,

Television

Our appreciation goes to Television New Zealand for their screening of the finals of the Smokefree Open and planning is currently in place for more extended coverage of Squash in 1994.

Acknowledgements

The Council expresses its heartfelt thanks to the many volunteers who have given a great deal of their time to the management and development of squash throughout the year. This especially includes the National Directors of Junior-Youth, Masters, Refereeing and Gradings and Rankings, the various selectors, team managers and members of both the High Performance Board and New Zealand Squash Centre Board.

The national office has had a very busy year and our sport is again extremely grateful for the exceedingly long hours and effort put in by Bill Murphy, as Chief Executive, and the backup and support given by the National Administrator, Anne Murphy. Squash in New Zealand continues to benefit immensely, in all areas, from their efforts. The Director of Squash Development, Butch Gifford is coming to the end of his contract. Butch's dedication and commitment to his job has involved him in working incredibly hard and efficiently in the development role, both of players and clubs. No sport has ever had a better servant.

FINANCIAL

The 1993 year ended in a deficit of \$46,700, compared to a budgeted surplus of \$1,280. This large variance is mainly due to the two decisions taken by Council during the year, to continue with one event without sponsorship being confirmed and another where additional, needed, sponsorship was not confirmed. The Council believed that both the National League and the Smokefree Squash Open were important for the profile of our sport, and so agreed to underwrite these events by up to \$20,000 each. Unfortunately the sponsorship did not eventuate and so the cost to New Zealand Squash was a little under \$40,000.

A further drop in the return from New Zealand Squash Centre, resulted in an \$8,629 difference between forecast and actual. The Centre is in the same position as many clubs throughout the country, and the Board is continually looking at ways to market the Centre to the public. The results of the market research and the subsequent marketing recommendations should be of great assistance to them for the future.

One very disappointing drop in income was the affiliation fees, where disaffiliating clubs resulted in almost \$6,000 less than was forecast, being received.

Savings in several areas were able to be made with Management and Operations being \$12,647 less than forecast and International \$14,966 less than forecast, but most of these savings were necessary to carry out the market research, and commence work on developing the market strategy.

The Council is disappointed with the final result but are confident that the decisions taken, which adversely affected this, were in the best long term interests of squash. The Council is however very conscious of the importance of returning to surplus results in the future.

The forecast for 1994 shows a small surplus, but dependant upon various decisions taken at this years AGM, and the development of the marketing strategy, a rebudget may well be necessary early next year.

MEMBERSHIP

Registered membership totalled 36740 at 30 September, a drop of 1834 (4.75%) on 1992.

While there is still rationalisation going on in some clubs with their membership records and in particular their grading lists, the trend is not satisfactory, overall.

Hawkes Bay Gisborne is the only district to counter the trend with an increase of over 8%. All other districts have shown decreases ranging from 2.41% to 9%.

57 of the 263 affiliated clubs have increased their membership in the past 12 months proving that proactive management and promotion continues to get results.

7 new Clubs have affiliated during the year however, including the amalgamation of two Clubs, there have been 12 disaffiliations reducing the number of affiliated clubs to 264.

EVENTS

Air New Zealand National Championships

This prestigious event was hosted by the Hawkes Bay Squash Club in Napier with great interest being shown in who was to be Susan Devoy's successor as womens title holder. An inspired Philippa Beams outplayed Leilani Marsh in the women's final with Sarah Cook and Jade Wilson battling out the minor money. After a punishing 5 set semi final with Wayne Werder, Glen Wilson was expected to be slightly "jaded" in the men's final against Paul Steel. This was indeed not the case and one of the best finals in recent years eventuated, with a standing ovation from the crowd when Steel eventually triumphed.

In the District Teams events the women's title was won by Canterbury for the first time with the mens going to Bay of Plenty for the third year running and sixth occasion in the past 7 years.

Congratulations to all winners and to the Hawkes Bay SRC for hosting an excellent event. The 1994 Championships will be held at Henderson.

National Squash League

The second year of the National Squash League commenced in late May at the Mount Maunganui SC and after visiting all license areas prior to the respective Districts Opens, finished again at the Hamilton SC where Waikato retained their title.

This year with the event lacking a sponsor it was underwritten by New Zealand Squash, but more effort must be directed in this area for the event to continue in 1994.

A special thanks to the League manager Ian Newton for the excellent manner in which the event was staged.

Smokefree NZ Open

Auckland was again the venue for the Smokefree Open, New Zealand's major international Squash tournament, where it was hosted by Henderson Club with the semifinals and finals at the Mercury Theatre.

The tournament provided some excellent and hard fought Squash, none more so in the mens event which saw local hero Paul Steel win the title in front of a vocal and partisan crowd.

Australia's Michelle Martin proved too classy in the women's event, to win Susan Devoy's vacant title.

Television New Zealand's coverage was well received and kept Squash in the public profile.

Satellite Tournaments

Lack of sponsorship in the main contributed to only one satellite tournament being held. This was hosted in



Christchurch in conjunction with the South Island Championships and applied to the women's draw only.

Unisys National Club Teams Championships

This popular event continues to play an important role in the lower grades of squash. 526 teams competed (down slightly on 1992) with 64 competing in the finals.

Thanks to the host clubs who all did a tremendous job.

Cousins Shield/Mitchell Cup

The premier club title event this year was hosted for the first time by the Titirangi Club, holder of the Cousins Shield. Entries were up on the previous year with 15 men's and 10 women's teams competing which made for some interesting, and very even Squash.

An enthralling encounter in the Cousins Shield final eventually saw Remuera overcome Henderson in front of a capacity crowd, while Henderson retained the Mitchell Cup beating Panmure.

Players Representatives

Mark Gribben of Dunedin and Glen Collins from Hamilton very ably filled these positions during the year. Under the microscope were standard of dress, tournament withdrawals, random draws, ranking system, prizemoney and disciplinary matters. Councils thanks are extended to the players reps for their contribution to the game.

Tournament Schedule

This is becoming more difficult to compile each year due to the changing scene especially in the major fixtures area. A full review of the schedule will be undertaken in 1994.

INTERNATIONAL

The Womens Junior World Championships in Malaysia earlier this year brought results never exceeded by any New Zealand team. The team of Sarah Cook, Jade Wilson, Glenda Knox and Katrina Black were a very close runner up, and Sarah Cook and Jade Wilson finished second and third respectively, in the individual event. This was an outstanding achievement from a dedicated team ably led by Rob Crothall and Jenny Webster.

As this report is being prepared, the mens team is due to compete in the World Championships in Pakistan, and is training well. Ross Norman, now ranked seven in the world, but earlier in the year being as high as six again, is proving to be one of the most durable players of all time. His efforts, together with the results of Paul Steel, Glen Wilson and Wayne Werder on the international scene, means that New Zealand continues to be highly respected in international squash circles.

Meetings

New Zealand was represented at both the Oceania meeting held in Noumea in May and the World Squash Federation meeting in Johannesburg in September.

A further meeting between New Zealand and Australia respresentatives was held in Auckland in August and its pleasing to report that the relationship between the two countries has never been more co-operative.

World Federation

Susie Simcock continues as a vicepresident of the world body and Susan Devoy was further honoured at this years World Squash Federation AGM, when she was elected a founder member of the World Squash Hall of Fame.

SELECTORIAL

The senior selector's role is to select national teams, in particular for world championship events, to produce an annual ranking list of the top sixteen men and women, and to use current form to seed major individual and teams tournaments.

In some respects, over the last few years the selector's tasks have become more streamlined. The panel of Barrie Matthews (Chairman), Barry Gardiner and Sandra Tinkler has worked together now for a number of years and clubs hosting major tournaments seem more aware of the selectors requirements for results and of their role in assisting with seedings. The selectors now have access to more information about player form, i.e. individual results from the grading list.

On the other hand, over the last few years there has been an increasing trend for a significant number of the top 20 players to take part only in tournaments in their immediate area. This has meant that some players have not had enough results from major tournaments to qualify for an end-of-season ranking. Worse still, it has become increasingly difficult to compare the performances of players from different areas who never play each other. The grading list is helpful to some extent but can be unreliable for top players. The computerised ranking system for top players has been trialled over the past two years and has potential but inaccuracies will need monitoring because New Zealand has so few full time or travelling players.

There is consideration to automate some of the processes which are at present carried out by the selectors. However the selectors report that the players meeting at the national championships generally felt that using selectors was still the fairest way of making the final input into seedings, rankings and national team selections.

MASTERS

The Masters Review was adopted by the 1992 Annual Conference and recommendations contained have been implemented. This included the re formation of a Masters Committee comprising the Director, a representative from Council as Chairman and the 3 selectors.

North and South Island Championships were held for the first time, in conjunction with the Waikato and Canterbury district championships.

Three separate Masters grading lists have been introduced this year and these have proved very beneficial for players and selectors.

Networking of masters pro-

grammes is in place with most districts participating well.

There are two new age groups introduced to the national championships - Mens 65+ and Womens 60+.

Gib Board National Championships

Christchurch S.R.C. hosted the national championships on Labour weekend, followed by the inter-district teams in which 7 districts competed and was won by Auckland.

Next years event will be held at the Kamo S.R.C. in Northland.

New Zealand Australia Test Series

It was New Zealand's turn to host this annual series which was held in conjunction with the national championships. Australia won 3/0 but only after hard fought competition, particularly in the first two tests.

The inaugural Oceania Masters competition did not take place this year as scheduled but will begin in Western Samoa in 1994. Australia are hosting the World Masters Games in September/ October 1994 which will include squash. Accordingly there will be no New Zealand/Australia test series next year.

JUNIOR-YOUTH SQUASH

The Junior-Youth Committee and all involved personnel in junior organization look back on the 1993 year with a degree of satisfaction.

Following what appeared to be two or three years of some turmoil, it has generally been a settled year. The principal tournaments held were extremely well organised and run and there was good participation from virtually all Districts. It is also a healthy sign to see so many Districts contributing towards International event competition.

The addition of a member of the national committee to the particular events organisation seemed to assist in ironing out what had previously been minor problem areas. John McGregor's excellent work over the past years is acknowledged as he is not seeking re election this year and there will therefore be a new chairman of selectors. Appreciation is expressed to John for the work undertaken by him and to the national director Kathy Pepper.

Thanks are also expressed to the many District junior convenors who put many hours into organising District events, selecting and organising teams to participate in New Zealand events.

International Events

The highlight of the year's international programme was the successful participation of the New Zealand team in the World Womens Junior Championships held in Malaysia. This was a very well prepared team and the results showed that. The team ultimately finished second and Sarah Cook was runner up in the World Individual event. This was a tremendous effort by her, and, with third placed Jade Wilson still eligible for the next event in 1995, the future looks positive.

The Oceania Age Group Tournament continues to develop. This year a representative team was again selected with the boys finishing second to Australia and the girls winning. In the individual events Shelley Kitchen won the Under 15 title and Jade Wilson and Chad Sunde finished runners up in the Under 19 titles.

What was especially pleasing insofar as the Oceania Tournament was concerned was the participation of some very positive Districts in sending individuals to this event. All in all a group of 31 went from New Zealand. This is a trend that we hope will continue.

Two players, Shelley Kitchen and George Crosby participated in the Australian Age Group Championships. Both players performed with distinction.

This year we were also fortunate to have a visit from a Hong Kong development team. This is a team that the Hong Kong Institute of Sport is preparing for next year's World Junior Mens event in New Zealand. The team comprised some extremely talented players and certainly Hong Kong looks as if they will be a force next year. They completed a small internal tour throughout the South Island.

National Events

Looking back over the various championships held this year, these continue to be well supported and still viewed by participants as a highlight of their squash careers. All sponsored by Slazenger, the South Island Age Groups were hosted by Timaru S.R.C and the North Island Age Groups held at Remuera R.C. The NZ Age Groups were hosted by the Christchurch Football Club in Christchurch. These events once again, included the Under 19 age group. The latter tournament was probably the largest event hosted in the South Island for many years.

The Slazenger New Zealand Open and Inter-District teams events were successfully hosted by the Whangarei T & S.R.C and apart from one minor hitch, there was some excellent squash and everyone participated in a true sportsmanlike manner.

Youth Championships

The Slazenger North Island and South Island Youth Championships were held over Easter weekend with the North Island tournament at Putaruru and the South Island at Christchurch. The Slazenger New Zealand Youth Championships were hosted by the Upper Hutt Club.

These three events reinforced, by the participating number, the need to make provision for this age group of player. In the national championships in particular, there was some extremely competitive squash of an excellent standard.

Selectors

The role of junior selectors as indicated in last year's report is continuing to develop. The High Performance Board has taken over the obligation of managing and selecting the Slazenger squad and the selectors role is principally the selection of participants in the Oceania tournament, the World Junior Championships and the ranking lists. The role developed with the setting of tournaments and the identification of player talent. There has been increased communication between the selectorial team and the High Performance Board which augers well for the continued development of the competi-

tive junior squash base. In addition to that, the selectors are becoming more heavily involved in the organisation of national events in ensuring that the needs of the Districts are satisfied.

New Zealand Secondary School Championships

The Slazenger Secondary School Championships were held this year in the Wellington District. From reports received, it was a very successful event with 38 teams participating. The eventual winners were Westlake Boys High and Kaitaia College.

Future

It is always difficult to predict what the future holds. The stated direction of those involved in managing junior squash is to continue to expand the network of people involved in the Junior-Youth area. This happened to a degree this year however communication still appears to be a problem. Next year the Junior-Youth Committee intends to work hard in supplying as much information as possible through the Kiwi Squash magazine. In addition, it must maintain its links with the Districts and with those especially motivated within Districts in these fields.

The Junior-Youth Committee looks forward with a great deal of enthusiasm to the 1994 World Junior Mens Championships to be hosted in Christchurch. All Districts should be looking for full participation and spin offs from this event. Oceania, to be held next year in Australia, must also continue to be a focus for Juniors and Districts.

SQUASH DEVELOPMENT

Club of the Year

Initial registrations for this year's Club of the Year were down on previous years. The percentage of final submissions for the award were the same as prevous years, i.e. 50%.

Congratulations to the Morrinsville Squash Club who were awarded with the trophy, a NZ plaque and the \$1000 prize. The Club has been extremely "member" orientated during the year and this together with the completion of its third court and complex upgraded it has a venue to be proud of.

Kamo Club was highly commended by the selection panel.

Club Development

The need for more time to be spent in the area has been borne out by both the Squash Development Director's findings and the results of the Market Research Survey. It is an extremely difficult area to plan and programme for, as the turnover of club management often also means the loss of expertise in this particular area, which then means lack of drive at the level it needs to be really pushed at.

Ways of uniting club people at the coal face and have everyone promoting Club development in a much more united way is being looked at as part of the Marketing recommendations.

The Club Management Handbook was distributed earlier this year and received great response from many Club people however again there are too many Club committee personnel who do not even know it is available and this needs to be changed in the new year.

Kiwisquash

The Kiwisquash programme continues with emphasis on Club linkage with schools. In the future it also needs to concentrate on getting Clubs to support the erecting of low cost squash facilities in primary schools in particular.

The pilot initiated in Canterbury is currently being taken up by four other Districts.

Secondary Schools

Most Districts now have some form of Secondary School competition and a very successful NZ Secondary Schools Championships was again held this year. The National Secondary Schools Squash Committee is looking at how schools can get players on the national grading lists as an extra incentive.

The objective for 1994 will be to enhance Secondary School Squash in conjunction with the Hillary Commission initiative Sportsfit.

Coach Development

Major steps forward have been achieved in the coaching area during the year.

The High Performance Programme was initiated with District involvement since March, and together this will provide an ongoing emphasis in ensuring a strong accreditation programme is maintained.

A new name for the Level 'O' coaches will be designed in the new year to give these personnel more status and credibility. Level 1 accreditation has been in full swing with accredited numbers substantially increased.

Two level two courses were held during the year involving 20 coaches who are still in the process of completing their 12 month assignments for final accreditation.

The introduction of an accredited level 3 course reached a further step this year with the agreement between New Zealand Squash and Squash Australia to jointly design the required course. This will take place during 1994 with the first course planned for 1995.

Skill charts were circulated to Clubs and in particular Junior Co-Ordinators with coaches putting pressure on for early utilization.

Womens Development

This successful programme over the past 3 years interestingly has produced a disproportionate number of women coaches to men.

For 1994 there will be a concentration on the promotion of qualified women coaches to attain higher accreditation and the programme for 1994 will include educational workshops for preparation for level 2.

Nga Hau E Wha Squash Development

This programme has run into administration problems and so the progress of qualified coaches in this area has been negligible. However, there has been some activity in the Wellington area at Level One and these coaches contribute a great deal to the overall squash development in the country.

REFEREEING

Since the AGM at Palmerston North last November Council has been concentrating on implementing the format of the Refereeing Review to introduce a more enhanced programme for the future.

During the year Chas Evans as National Director and his committee of Gary Hutchison, Dave Toomey and Peter Highsted attended to the refereeing requirements as under the old format.

In September the new structure for the programme was finalised to include a national committee involving a national director, 3 regional co-ordinators and an Executive Council representative as Chairman. The Committee will concentrate on management and communications linking a network of District co-ordinators and eventually Club co- ordinators.

The new Director is Peter Filbee, and with the three regional co-ordinators Kaye Jackson, Joss Urbhan and Mike Irving, they have the task to take on board the review, prepare the new programme and present it at the Annual Conference for implementation in 1994. This will require Districts and Clubs to take on board co-ordinators and examiners to achieve a strong communication channel.

The new structure will focus strongly on training by utilizing the new national accreditation panel, and National and District examiners, to carry the training programme out.

Seminars

As follow up to their attendance at the International Referees School in Vancouver in October 1992, International Referees Gavin Whyte, Peter Highsted and Chas Evans held seminars, covering all aspects of refereeing in Christchurch, Palmerston North and Auckland mid year. These seminars were well attended by interested parties ranging from District to National Referees.

National Qualifications

NR2 qualifications were gained by Paul Sneyd of Masterton and Wayne Munro of Wellington lifting the overall total of national referees to 53. The new programme will however fully reassess activity in 1994.

Resource Material

With the international updating of the Rules of Squash as at May 1993 a new rule book has been produced together with new theory examinations for both players and referees.

Awards

Dave Toomey of Auckland was awarded the Derek Cook Memorial Trophy for services to refereeing as recognition of the work put in producing the new theory examinations, his input in the review process, and general enthusiasm imparted to District refereeing.

Thanks to all tournament referees appointed this year and congratulations on a fine job done by Gary Hutchison at the Smokefree Open and also to Dave Toomey, Sandra Tinkler and Pauline Boyle at the Nationals.

International

Peter Highsted, Chas Evans and Gavin Whyte have retained their I.R. status in the latest World Squash Federation ratings with Chas Evans appointed director of refereeing for the Oceania Region. Chas Evans was invited to attend the Qatar International Tournament last December and more recently, the Women's World Open in Johannesburg and the Zimbabwe Open.

Peter Highsted will be officiating at the Men's World Open and Teams event in Karachi in November and Gary Hutchison has been appointed Championship Referee for the 1994 World Junior Mens Championships being held in Christchurch.

GRADINGS AND RANKINGS

The UNISYS Computer Squash Grading System continues to successfully support the competitive squash scene in New Zealand. On an annual basis, some 150,000 individual match results are entered into the system, from over 680 tournaments, district interclub and various teams events.

In September Grading List numbers totalled 20,124 players (12,836 male and 7,614 females) which is a reduction of 770 players compared with the same point last season.

Over the past couple of seasons, since the change to the method by which NZ Squash determines its affiliation fees, there has been a marked decline in the number of "inactive" players on the grading list, as individual clubs have sought to rationalize their club levies.

This fall in inactive players has to a large extent corresponded with the overall fall in the number of players on the grading list.

Grading System Enhancement

As projected in last years Annual Report, the 1993 season has seen the introduction of new Junior and Masters "Grading Lists", with players sorted by grade (points) within the normally acknowledged age groups.

These listings are not intended for general publication as with standard grading lists, but rather to assist district and national junior/masters personnel with their activities.

Ranking System

Following some adjustments to the operating parameters, the ranking system was again run as a pilot during the 1993 season.

The system is now basically performing as expected, however the main concern to emerge has been the very small numbers of players who played more than two or three of the district championships and/or national events over each of the past two seasons.

This in itself is not causing problems, other than to severely limit the number of players that can be accurately ranked by the system.

To overcome this, it is intended to widen the scope of the ranking system and to include selected club "open" tournaments during the 1994 season.

Thanks

The District Statisticians are the backbone of the grading system and it would not be the successful system that it is without their ongoing and time consuming work.

And likewise, considerable thanks must go to Charmian Hayes the National Co- ordinator, for her continued excellent work with both the grading and ranking systems over the past season.

HIGH PERFORMANCE PROGRAMME

1 993 signalled the beginning of a new era in NZ Squash. A High Performance Programme blueprint was formulated identifying pathways of excellence for Players and Coaches.

A substructure was identified linking the existing Institute with individuals and development groups within the regions throughout NZ.

The Institute programme was established in 1990 with the assistance of UDC Finance and the NZ Sports Foundation. Whilst the UDC Finance commitment to the Institute ceased early this year, the High Performance Programme was able to be put in place through the continuing support of the New Zealand Sports Foundation and with new involvement by way of the Hillary Commission Academy programme.

The Institute remains at the head of the programme, providing elite performance levels for both Players and Coaches, with the extended programme incorporating separate initiatives and programmes which were underway or planned.

The High Performance Programme therefore now has twin goals:

- To assist outstanding young Squash players to realise their full potential and NZ to gain success in International competition.
- To increase the levels of Coaching expertise and the number of highly trained coaches in NZ.

Programme Operation

This has been led by a hard working 'team operation' managed by Kevin Sheehy, (Director of the Squash Institute) and Butch Gifford, (Director of Squash Development), in consultation with and assisted by Neven Barbour and other Institute Operations personnel. The appointment of four Regional Coaches in April as a first stage of the enhanced programme accelerated the delivery of the Institute philosophy and training methods to identified talented squash players and coaches within their regions.

The regional coaches appointed in this historic move were: Gaye Bryham (Auckland), Mark Devoy (Hamilton), Paul McFadzien (Christchurch) and Graeme Randolph (Palmerston North).

The Board of Management has also been very much 'hands on' and closely associated with operational activities.

Performance Highlights

The year has produced some excellent results, notably the Junior Women's teams finishing second in the world championships with Sarah Cook and Jade Wilson second and third respectively in the individual title, Paul

Glen Wilson during one of the coaching sessions held on Fridays during the National League.



Steel winning New Zealand's major international tournament and improved world rankings all round by most players. An additional highlight has been the incredible performance by New Zealand's Ross Norman in retaining his high international ranking where he is currently No.7 in the world.

Individual performances have included:

Paul Steel

Won both the Air New Zealand National title and the Smokefree NZ Open Championship. Ranked 2 in New Zealand and 38 in the world, up from 55 this time last year.

Glen Wilson

Recorded best ever performances in latter part of the year including wins over international players ranked 18, 16 and 8 which saw him reach the semifinals of the Australian Open and quarter finals of the Hong Kong Open.

Philippa Beams

Consolidated her international ranking to 25 on top of excellent late season form which included winning the national title and being ranked No.1 in New Zealand.

Leilani Marsh

First year on international programme finishing the season with a world ranking of 27 and improved national ranking of No.2. Defeated World No. 10 and 11 ranked players during the year. Won a WISPA tournament and reached final of another.

Chad Sunde

Runner up in Oceania Championships and won NZ Junior Championship title. Improved National ranking to 7 and established international ranking of 184.

Sarah Cook

Runner up in the Junior World Championships, improved NZ ranking to 3 and established new international ranking of 46. Won most improved player award for New Zealand.

Jade Wilson

Third in Junior World Championships, runner up in Oceania Championships and improved national ranking from 7 to No.4. First time world ranking of 39.

Wayne Werder

Retained national ranking of 4 and established new world ranking of 102. Top performance at national championships to reach semifinals. Won most improved player award.

Daniel Sharplin

Following an injury curtailed season in 1992, confirmed New Zealand ranking at No.6 and reached semifinals of National Championships.

Campbell Barbour

Maintained his national ranking finishing in 10th position.

Shelley Kitchen

Won the Oceania under 15 title and ranked top Under 15 player in New Zealand...

World Team Preparation

In November 1992 the Institute undertook the preparation of the Junior Women's squad and team through to the championships in Malaysia, under the direction of Coach Manager Rob Crothall and assistant coach Jenny Webster. This involved seven players initially and the selected team of four.

The Junior Men's squad, of 9 players, vying for places in the 1994 World Championship team have been in training throughout the season with two camps at the Institute base in Te Atatu, and the next planned for December.

Major contenders for the 1993 Men's World Championships team were all Institute members and their training programmes were designed accordingly.

14 players have been identified and are underway with their training programmes for the 1994 Women's World Championships held next October in England.

Slazenger Squash

The High Performance Programme has taken over the management of this squad with the regional coaches overseeing the individual athlete programmes.

The squad includes 25 players involving all New Zealand Squash's emerging talent under 17 years of age and who are not otherwise involved in the Institute programme.

Coaches

The High Performance Programme is responsible for the advancement of coaches above level one.

The Institute operations team in conjunction with the Regional Coaches have carried out coach education workshops in nine of the ten districts during the year with this programme a major priority for further development next year.

To this end two level 2 courses with Australian presenters assisting were held. This involved 20 coaches who are still in the process of completing their 12 month assignments for final accreditation.

The introduction of accredited level 3 courses reached a step further this year with the agreement between New Zealand Squash and Squash Australia to jointly design the required course. This will take place during 1994 with the first course planned for 1995.

Sports Science

One of the key elements with the establishment of the High Performance Programme has been to enhance the Sports Science programme for Squash.

This has included during the year:

- The developing of a Sports Science directory for Squash.
- Registration with the New Zealand Sports Drug Agency and the commencement of out of competition random testing, as well as general drug education for squash players.
- Participation in a two year study on research relating to muscle imbalance and injury, in conjunction with New Zealand Tennis.
- Representation at Coaching New Zealand's seminars on strength and conditioning, post exercise recovery and injury prevention/management and field testing.
- Establishment of resource material data base.

NEW ZEALAND SQUASH CENTRE

The 1992/93 financial year for the NZ Squash Centre has not seen the upturn expected, with a very similar result to last year eventuating.

Shop sales were up on last year by 7%, however this did not make up for the court decline in turnover.

The value of expenses decreased in various areas including a 10% reduction in wages and minor savings in other areas. There was an increase in the advertising expense to promote the Squash Centre.


An area in the Conference room has been leased out as a Student services/Copying office and this is assisting revenue. Other revenue initiatives continue to be explored.





MENS WORLD CHAMPIONSHIPS

New Zealand was due to compete in the Mens World Championships in the last week of November in Karachi, Pakistan and the team, selected at the end of the Air New Zealand National Championships in September included Ross Norman, Paul Steel, Wayne Werder and Glen Wilson with Neven Barbour the Coach/Manager.

The objective was to defend, and improve where possible, on the fifth placing at the last championships held in Finland in 1991, Norman, Wilson and Steel all played in Finland with Werder the only newcomer to international teams competition.

Norman's remarkable form which has seen him hold his world ranking of seven at the age of 34 would provide tremendous experience for New Zealand at number one while Wilson and Steel would be expected to perform well given the international experience they had gained over the past two years. New Zealand drew the same pool as Australia along with Egypt and Sweden. England, Finland and the wildcard Pakistan who had finished a lowly eighth in Finland were drawn together in the other major pool with Netherlands.










Paul Steel and Australian Simon Baker in the final of the Smokefree Squash Open.



AIR NEW ZEALAND NATIONAL & LINK NATIONAL SQUASH CHAMPIONSHIPS

There was an expectant air all around the Hawkes Bay Squash Club during the week of the Air New Zealand Championships. It was nine years since the popular club had last held the event and it also marked the first occasion that Susan Devoy was not lining up for over ten years. Half a dozen players at least had their sights on her title.

Also, with the mens team to be named for the World Championships in Pakistan in November interest in the mens title was stronger than ever.

The standard of play in both sections lived up to anticipation and the excellent crowds during the individual events were treated to some great squash.

Philippa Beams, the number two seed and only remaining member of the 1992 World Championship team that had finished runner up in Canada, struck form at the right time to take the vacant womens title. She accounted for world junior runner up Sarah Cook in the semi finals before stamping considerable authority over the field when beating the top seed Leilani Marsh in the final.

The mens event was in some quarters expected to be a two horse race between Wilson and Steel however Werder decided otherwise and in a semi final match lasting a little over two hours he forced Glen Wilson to 9/7 in the fifth whereas Steel had a straight forward victory against Daniel Sharplin in his semi.

Wilson showed extreme courage to have Steel on the ropes on a number of occasions, which saw both players run themselves virtually to a stand still in one of the most exciting finals for years. Eventually Wilsons long battles during the week caught up and Steel ran out an easy winner in the fifth game.

In the Inter District teams events, Bay of Plenty notched up their sixth title in the mens championship while Canterbury, in a stunning upset over top seeds and defending champions Waikato, claimed the first ever title for both their province and the South Island.

Mens runners up Auckland on paper looked to have the better of Bay of Plenty however Tokoroa's Darryl Russell proved the Bay star when he dismissed Auckland's no 2 Campbell Barbour in short order in the critical

Canterbury's women heroes turned out to be Philippa Beams who came from behind in a hard fought match to repeat her individual success over Leilani Marsh while West Coast's Debra Alexander caused a major upset when she beat nationally ranked no. 7 Jenny Bell in an exciting final encounter to capture the South Island victory.



With Glen Wilson out of contention with injury, Steel's final opponent on both occasions was Waikato's Wayne Werder who he accounted for comfortably in the final of both titles.

Leilani Marsh won the North Island final against Sarah Cook but only after a tough semi final against former world junior runner up Lynora Hati who was making a come back to squash.

In the South Island Championships, which combined as an international ranking tournament and the Canterbury Championships, Marsh was in splendid form beating the world number 11 Rebecca O'Callaghan of Ireland and number 27 Meeghan Bell from Australia.

MOST IMPROVED PLAYERS

Policy on the awarding of the Most Improved Player trophies was changed this year to allow previous winners to be considered.

The selectors confirmed this widened the field considerably and produced far more competition amongst the candidates.

The winners announced at the Air New Zealand national championships in Napier, were Wayne Werder and Sarah Cook who, ironically, had both won the awards together in 1991. Twenty year old Werder capped off a very strong season with an excellent performance at the national championships which saw him cement a place in the mens world championship team.

Seventeen year old Cook went within a whisker of winning the world junior womens championships and provided some outstanding performances during the year including reaching the semi finals of the national championships.

RANKINGS

Major changes at the top of the womens rankings and steadiness in the mens top group highlighted the national squash rankings for 1993.

In the mens rankings Ross Norman who displayed remarkable form retaining his world No 7 ranking again held number one spot followed by National and New Zealand Open Champion Paul Steel. Glen Wilson and Wayne Werder retained their third and fourth positions respectively.

Michael McSherry appeared on the ranking list for the first time for many years in number five position with Daniel Sharplin, back after a curtailed year in 1992 through injury, coming into sixth position.

Youngster Chad Sunde continued his climb up the rankings to number seven, two positions higher than the previous year. Campbell Barbour climbed up one place from eleven to ten and Southern's Scott Gardiner moved to number fourteen with his first national ranking.

Wellington's Jason McLauchlan's steady form saw him awarded a ranking for the first time.

Philippa Beam's great season saw her rewarded with number one position in the women's rankings taking over Susan Devoy's long held dominance. Beams had a very consistent season culminating with a win in the National Championships over the number two ranked Leilani Marsh.

The young Kiwi stars that took New Zealand to runner up position in the World Junior Championships, Sarah Cook and Jade Wilson, are ranked three and four respectively, both climbing three places since last year. Waikato's Angie Toal, who caused a few upsets in tournaments during the year is ranked five ahead of youngster Fiona Dean and Waikato's representative Jenny Bell.

Six new faces appear in the bottom half of the rankings including Glenda Knox (twelve) and Katrina Black (fourteen) who also represented New Zealand at the World Junior Championships.

The selectors listed a number of players not eligibile for rankings having not played sufficient major tournaments. These included Rod Hayes, Tristan Franklin, Rodney Bannister and David Norman in the men along with Lynora Hati, Vicki Becker, Judith Casbolt, Debbie Alexander and Debra Shaw in the women.

STATEMENT OF ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1. General Accounting Policies

The measurement base adopted is that of historical cost.

Reliance is placed on the fact that the Association is a going concern. Accrual accounting is used to match expenses and revenues.

2. Consolidation

The trading result from the Centre and the operation of the Institute have not been incorporated into the income and expenditure account of the Association, due to the different nature of the operations. The three Balance Sheets however have been consolidated.

3. Stock

Stock has been valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Due allowance has been made for slow moving stock.

4. Depreciation

Apart from the Perspex Court referred to in the Annual Report depreciation generally is calculated at the ordinary rate.

5. Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable are stated at expected realisable value. Where a debt is considered to be irrecoverable it has been written off in the accounts.

6. Liabilities

Liabilities are stated at the estimated amounts payable.

7. New Zealand Squash Centre Valuation

An up-to-date valuation of the New Zealand Squash Centre has been impossible to obtain, but the latest estimate of the reinstatement cost of the buildings for insurance purposes is \$2.223 million.

8. Goods and Services Tax

All transactions are recorded exclusive of G.S.T.

9. Changes

There have been no material changes in accounting policies.



5TH WORLD JUNIOR WOMENS CHAMPIONSHIPS

New Zealand completed its most successful ever World Junior Championship in either mens or womens events when finishing second to Australia in Kuala Lumpur in July and early August.

The team comprised Sarah Cook (Christchurch), Jade Wilson (Auckland), Glenda Knox (Rotorua), and Katrina Black (Whakatane) with Rob Crothall of Auckland as Coach/Manager and Jenny Webster of Auckland, the Assistant Coach.

A squad of seven players had been in preparation for 18 months and team selection was announced at the North Island Open Championships in Whakatane on Queens Birthday weekend.

Cook was the only member of the team with experience in world events having represented New Zealand in Norway in 1991. Wilson, only 16 years of age, was relatively new to international squash while Knox and Black had not competed at all outside of New Zealand other than the Oceania Championships in Noumea in the month prior to team selection.

With 14 teams competing, the

Championships were split into two pools of round robin competition with New Zealand seeded fourth and drawn in Pool A behind top seeds England and fifth seeds Scotland the other main competition.

The Kiwis showed remarkable tenacity to dispose of newcomers South Africa and defending champions England early in the pool play. They then went on to comfortably dispose of USA, Malaysia, Hong Kong and finally Scotland, in all dropping games only to England and Scotland.

In the semi finals New Zealand lined up against tournament wild cards and tenth seeds Egypt who were competing in the womens championships for the first time. New Zealand had been very reliant on its top two players Sarah Cook and Jade Wilson throughout the championships and this again proved the case in the semi final clash, which the New Zealanders won 2/1.

Australia comfortably dispatched England in the other semi final and everything was set for a rematch of the Oceania Championships earlier in the month between Australia and New Zealand.

No 2 player Wilson gave New Zealand a great start by demolishing Natarsha Tippett in the first rubber and for some time in the second clash between the number one players Sarah Cook and the new Junior World Champion Rachel Grinham it looked as though New Zealand may repeat their Oceania success. Cook led 8/1 in both the first games but unfortunately succumbed to Grinham on both occasions 10/8 before losing the third 9/0. With the tie locked at one all Glenda Knox bravely tried to match the experience of Australia's Kim Keevil but New Zealand's great competitors proved too strong in the end.

Sixteen year old Rachel Grinham won the Open Championship held in the week prior to the teams event but not before the two top Kiwis Sarah Cook and Jade Wilson made a great mark on the event.

Cook showed tremendous skill to reach the final where the unorthodox and highly talented Grinham beat her in four games. Wilson, who had lost her semi final clash with Grinham, proved too strong for the English number one Jenny Tranfield to take third spot.

The overall depth of the Australian contingent finally won through, however the performance by the New Zealand players was nothing short of outstanding and augers well for the future of womens squash in the country.




