

President's Review Barry Gardiner President New Zealand Squash

1996/97 has been a year of change for New Zealand Squash. The need to reduce costs has dictated most of the decisions of the Association during the year.

Changes made by our new Chief Executive Officer to the management structure of N.Z. Squash has resulted in considerable reduction in staff (with associated one-off costs) and a subsequent emphasis on voluntary assistance.

This cost saving meant that as President I was unable to attend a number of events that normally the President would have attended. These events included the Senior Nationals, Juniors and Masters, and team events. I am unable therefore to report on these events but from feedback received each event was well organised with some outstanding games of squash.

Two of these games were the men's and women's senior individual titles won by Paul Steel and Leilani Joyce. Congratulations are extended from all squash players and officials to these two players who are credits to the game. Leilani's win was the climax to a superb three months during which she defeated three players ranked in the World's top six. Paul's win was his sixth in succession and beats by one Charlie Waugh's victories from 1960–1964 (but still some way to go to equal Susan Devoy's ten successful wins).

Overall I believe N.Z. Squash has made a considerable advance this year and has paved the way for further future advances.

- Player numbers have bottomed out and although gradual, squash numbers are definitely increasing.
- Clubs are becoming more aware that if they want to survive as viable organisations they have to cater for the changing needs of members and potential members.
- Communication between N.Z. Squash, Districts, Clubs and members has improved although there is still some way to go.
- And out there at the coalface, players from all over New Zealand continue to compete in interclub competitions and club and open tournaments with ever increasing numbers.

N.Z. Squash has had it ups and down over the past decade. I am firmly of the opinion that if it continues its present direction, with the assistance and cooperation of its district members, the game will in the next few years, reinstate itself within the top ten sports in the country.



Chairman's Review

In all my years in sports administration, I have found this year to be the most difficult. It began with the dramatic events of our last AGM and the difficulties which arose with the departure of Grant Scoones. It is not appropriate to canvas those in this report but suffice it to say that the consequences took a personal toll on all who were involved.

Since his arrival in April, David Knowles has been a revelation in re-establishing goodwill with the Districts.

Having the 1996-97 financial year split between Grant (three months), no CEO (four months) and David (five months) has complicated the management of the National Office. For this reason there has been a lack of progress but I believe it is only a check to our progress, nothing more. New Zealand Squash is still committed to a strategic plan, albeit in an altered format and delivery style.

The financial implications of the change of CEOs has caused considerable stress. The Executive Council chose to await the arrival of David Knowles before tackling the serious financial concerns: it was a case of balancing risk against damage and the end-of-year results suggest that this approach has not been as devastating as some critics predicted.

As a result of the restructuring, the National Office now employs fewer staff and, as a consequence, the role of Districts is upgraded so that they have a greater involvement in setting the direction and maintaining the momentum of change. While this may reduce the overheads of the National Office, it requires Districts to work harder and more effectively from a fragile volunteer base.

Under difficult circumstances, the Executive Council has functioned as best it can. Some councillors, like Alan Simpson, Jan McAra and Neven Barbour, have been able to take a "hands on" approach which has been of considerable assistance to David Knowles. Next year, however, some of the faces will be missing: Barry Gardiner has always been a "wise old head", a man of very dry wit, and Ed Post, not a member of "the old school", has been a refreshing and honest colleague at the Board table.

During the year the council has met on ten occasions to monitor the financial position and to consider the strategic options facing the sport. At grass-roots squash seems to me to be as strong as ever. People love to play the sport and the council's task is to harness this enthusiasm. Unfortunately, there is still no group consensus to mapping a path forward, no true "ownership" of a vision for the game which is shared by squash people everywhere.

For me, the highlights of the past year were the Junior Girls finishing second at the World Champs in Brazil, Club Kelburn's continuing ability to make a profit, and the fact that players clearly still want to play the game. While there has been stress and strain at the top end of the sport, at squash-court level nobody knows or, perhaps, cares much about the problems of national administrators.

In future, no doubt, I will see some of you on the squash court.



Report from David Knowles Chief Executive New Zealand Squash

The 1996-97 year has been a very difficult time for everyone involved in squash. For me, it has been an uncomfortable introduction grappling with major financial difficulties, the squash community's eroding confidence in the National Office, and the fact that the future of the game itself (as a major sport) is by no means assured. It's also worth noting that the financial pressures facing New Zealand Squash Inc are mirrored at community level where many clubs are struggling to make ends meet.

With New Zealand Squash facing a substantial budget blowout, I took to the Executive Council a recovery plan called "A Hard Pruning" and later, on 25 May at a Special General Meeting, the District Presidents endorsed the plan. Essentially the restructuring aimed to (1) cut planned expenditure, (2) downsize the staff at the National Office, and (3) generate new income. The results have meant discomfort for elite players who lost grants, programme directors and clubs hosting national events who lost financial support, and staff in Henderson who lost jobs. There has been no easy way to give people the unwelcome news.

Looking ahead and seeking new income for the game, I have signalled the need for squash people to recognise that the days of donation sponsorship are over. In future New Zealand Squash Inc (like other sports) will need to be able to "steer" the purchasing power of the collective squash community. To this end, I have asked for the co-operation of clubs and districts in establishing a National Club Member Register of 28,000 names, and in launching "SquashPLUS", a quality magazine which can be direct-mailed to the households of the squash club members three times a year. The pay-off is that if an individual club member can be persuaded to support a customer loyalty programme, then corporate sponsors will pay a commission on sales which can be split with between the New Zealand Squash and the club of the participating member.

This is a new approach to fundraising and squash is breaking new ground in trying to mobilise its 25,000 affiliated members. For the venture to succeed, NZS will need the active co-operation of its membership: put bluntly, if there are no sales, there is no income!

During the year I have also spent time developing a new strategic plan called "A Good Tomorrow". The thrust of the plan is to reallocate existing resource so that a greater spend is committed to regional development. Having talked to squash people up and down the country, I have been convinced that squash must invest in its own future: it must recognise that the "squash families" cannot reproduce themselves and that the statistics revealed in the August Grading List, for example, mean that there must be a concerted effort made by NZS and the Districts to "grow the game". A special (but not exclusive) focus must be given nationwide to junior squash so that young people, the seed-bed of any sport, are given the best-possible introduction to squash and are made to feel welcome by clubs.

If, however, the prevailing culture in squash clubs is indifferent or, worse, antagonistic towards a drive to encourage young people to play squash, then the arithmetic means that squash will suffer further decline. And with falling memberships, clubs will be faced with even greater financial hardship.

I believe there are several key issues which have still to be resolved. Squash people everywhere have to decide whether the game should remain a boutique sport (what I call the "do nothing" option) or become a major sport again by making a decisive commitment to grow the game.

If the choice is the latter, then the leadership of the sport (at Executive Council and Senior Management levels) must win back the confidence of the membership, and the ten districts must play a more active role in collecting club levies and co-funding the Regional Development strategy. Clubs must learn to act quickly and co-operatively in supporting national and district initiatives, and become aware of the changing trends in the sport and leisure sector.

In simple language, and from where I sit, the question is this:

Is the squash community of New Zealand ready and willing to follow a lead?

It is a question which is still unanswered perhaps.

During the difficult times this year I have appreciated the encouragement of people, many of whom I have met for the first time. I would like to formally thank Chairman Murray Withers, and the District Presidents, but also Neven Barbour, Alan Simpson and Jan McAra who, as councillors, have each taken a specific burden of work from my shoulders. I have been encouraged, too, by the staff at the Hillary Commission and the New Zealand Sports Foundation who monitor the substantial funding given to squash; by Rob Walker at Club Kelburn for proving every day that it is possible to segment the market and make a profit; and by those individuals like Leilani Joyce and Steve Scott who have responded so readily to my question about how squash might make progress.

My hope is that squash people want "A Good Tomorrow" and are prepared to work together to make it happen.

Squash Numbers

The Hillary Commission's "Sport and Physical Activity" survey suggests that 161,000 adult New Zealanders played squash at least once in the last twelve months. However, there are only 28,000 affiliated club members so the lesson is clear: the game is popular but the delivery system (the club) must find ways to offer more to the casual player.

In the competitive area there have been exciting developments...


- A great experience for Junior Women competitors to compete in Rio de Janeiro in the first ever World Squash event in the South American continent.


And finally ...

MASTERS

I am pleased to report that Masters Squash is very healthy throughout the country and there has been a number of positive developments and encouraging progress over the last year.

The District Championships are now firmly established. Most districts are now conducting interclub competitions and the corporate sector seems to be showing interest in the highly successful national championships.

The 4th World Championships were held in Johannesburg in May and attracted an excellent entry of 504 players from 26 nations. A very social and popular group of twenty Kiwis attended this tournament and they were very supportive and vocal in encouraging Jenny Tyler to win the Women's 55+ title and Ian Holding in reaching the Men's 40+ semi final.

A new format has been introduced into the Inter-District Teams Event which sees a separate men's and women's competition and brings Masters in line with the Senior and Junior Inter-Districts. Masters Squash is grateful to the Parkview and Christchurch Clubs for generously donating trophies for these two new events.

The disappointment in the last year was the cancellation of the national teams visit to New South Wales for the Trans-Tasman Test Series due to the fact that New Zealand Squash could not offer any financial assistance. It was always going to be a difficult assignment to expect players to provide their own funding for the tour.

In conclusion, I would like to acknowledge the work carried out by my co-selectors lan Rowe and Sylvia Wesney and all the district convenors who have donated a large amount of time over the last year.

REFEREEING 1997

Refereeing numbers are still of great concern. Our numbers are not increasing because players are very reluctant to involve themselves in learning the rules of the game they play. We have asked the National Coach, Paul Wright to include some basic refereeing skills in all Regional and National Camps next year in an effort to increase our the skills of our Juniors. Regional Coaches will also be encouraged to learn and impart some refereeing skills in their courses.

Four workshops were held this year, at the Waikato, Canterbury, Auckland and Wellington Opens with reasonable success for those who attended. Five people from Northland attended the Auckland clinic, so next year we will go to Northland. Workshops are also planned for Bay of Plenty, Central and Southern.

With the new rule changes this year we investigated the possibility of purchasing the Australian Rule book to save us printing costs. This eventuated with a combined book being produced. Australia has also updated its very popular "Guide to Understanding the Rules", and its "Decisions, Decisions" video is due out early in the new year.

It was unfortunate midway during the year to lose funding of Referees to National events (except for the Tournament Referees) due to NZ Squash's financial situation. This will have to be addressed before next year to ensure that we have the required number of referees at National events. It proved by not funding referees to Senior Nationals, surely the major event on our calendar this year, that we did not get the required number of referees there. It is also necessary for Referees to be able to keep their required standard up by being able to do high quality matches.

Chas Evans, Peter Highsted and Gavin Whyte are still keeping New Zealand's name to the fore overseas with them all continually being invited to attend WSF events. A major coup for Chas is being invited to referee at the Commonwealth Games next September.

My thanks to Francis Scordino at the National Office for his continuing efforts with Refereeing Education & Development. Also to Chas, Peter and Gavin for their efforts in keeping us all up to date with our knowledge of the rules. Thanks to all the Referees who have worked so hard this year.

JUNIOR-YOUTH PROGRAMME 1997

international:

The 1997 year was one of the most successful for Junior Squash. Paul Wright and his staff worked very hard to put together a competent Junior Women's Team for the World Junior Women's Championships in Rio. The tremendous results from the Championship showed just how committed and well performed everyone was.

Junior National Coaching Scheme

It was also a year for re-establishing and refining the National coaching programme for age groups from U13, U15, U17 and U19. At the same time Regional coaches were asked to prepare and coach regional squads. The National Squads were selected mainly from the top performers at the National Junior events. (South Island, North Island and NZS Junior Championships).

The actual number chosen for each age squad was based on manageability and cost with Paul overseeing the programme from start to finish. The National clinics were staffed by a number of Regional Coaches who were invited to assist. This format allowed the National Coach to involve Regional Coaches and to pass on knowledge and skills as well as monitor the method/techniques and ability of the Coaches. I believe this programme is working well and both players and coaches receive the benefit of sharing experiences and knowledge over an intensive weekend of training and assessing.

National Championship Events

It was most unfortunate that the NZS Junior programme this year was without a major sponsor. This caused many concerns and lead to some difficulties both for those in charge of junior events and players themselves, but despite the short notice, both the North Island and South Island Junior Championship hosts were able to secure some excellent sponsorship that greatly assisted in the event. However, the Junior National Age Group Championship was not so fortunate. Despite that, the players were extremely gracious in accepting the situation.

There is also some concern that the National Age Group and Teams event is starting to reach a point where numbers may soon make it difficult for most clubs to host. Our "open" policy on entry has been well supported and has been very good for junior squash. But with increasing junior membership we can expect the rotation between Districts will become more restricted to the main centres where sufficient local clubs can pool resources. There are options we could take to avoid this occurring (if indeed it was a problem), but what is important is that junior events continue to be manageable for clubs that host it as well as successful for all juniors who participate in it. We will monitor this carefully over the next few years.

On a more pleasant note, there are signs from our tournament results to suggest that some of our top age group players are reaching a higher level of ability than their predecessors. This is a good sign for the future and we hope that our players in general will continue to achieve a higher level of skill.

Entry Fees and Host Accreditation

In 1996 we raised the entry fee to assist clubs in charge of junior events. Again the absence of a sponsor at the National Championship meant that a higher than acceptable level of fees were used to meet some of the costs incurred. This was an unfortunate turn of affairs and in a way exposed the Junior Programme to the shortcomings associated with the event.

Important points to note: sponsorship for National events does add glamour and class to the programme. But in the absence of a National sponsor, host clubs will need more time to help to establish local support. Clearly sosme form of accreditation will need to be firmly established and in operation if we are to avoid some of the problems we experienced this year.

However, despite the higher costs to players in the two years, we have seen some remarkable outcomes. Players and parents are prepared to pay for services and accept decisions based on available funding if they are made aware of the facts. However, clubs that are willing to host major Junior Events must offer better services that in turn give a better economic return for themselves while still allowing participants to experience the full benefits of a well organised National event. I disagree with the view that an active bar is the main solution to any tournaments economic woes. Unfortunately some administrators still run their tournaments on that premise and in the case of junior events, the juniors become the losers — in one form or another.

Sponsorship and User-pays

We are continuing to strive to find new sponsorship for the Junior Programme. It is also clear that we cannot successfully expand our development programme while the National Association struggles to make ends meet. Development tours are on hold and the U21 (and U23?) could do with more assistance than is available at present.

I think its time to look carefully at the need for players in all our development squads to contribute more to the training they undertake through the NZS junior programme. The "user pay" principle will enable more training for more players to occur. In cases where serious hardship would be experienced, I believe it would be the responsibility of the District and the Club of that person to assist wherever they can. Such arrangements and practices are already in place in some Districts.

Coaching for the future

I believe the programme for Junior Development is starting to meet the needs of our top players and is making good progress towards involving a wider scope of club players. In time it is hoped that a sound and stable platform will form from the many other opportunities will arise for players to reach the top of New Zealand and International Squash.

The programme also allows coaches to further their opportunities and aspirations in meeting the needs of top athletes. Regional Coaches involved in the management of National Squads are monitored and carefully assessed to ensure a consistency of understanding and application of the principles involved in developing squash skills. Staff commitment, appraisal of staff and constant close monitoring of athletes will enable all parties in the programme to achieve their best.

But at the end of the day, the success of our Junior Programme still relies on the good will and skilful management of all coaches from club through to top national level. I hope the Regional Delivery of NZS Programmes will be able to continue to foster and support the role of coach in all Districts and regions.

CLUB KELBURN

The last twelve months have been productive with real growth in our core areas of business.

Court fees, the biggest single area of income, was up by 7% on the previous year, the result of special effort to (1)promote the Club Kelburn social and business house leagues, (2) provide a personalised coaching programme, and (3) achieve economies and efficiencies where-ever possible. Branded products like "Big Leagues" (social leagues), "Serious Fun" (business-house), and "Personal Squash Training" (coaching) have been successful in segmenting the market. Each "product" has its own logo and has been designed to fit in under the Club Kelburn "umbrella" brand.

Gym revenue was up by a remarkable 77% and is the major reason for our profitability. Club Kelbum has established a niche market and further investment in gym equipment is currently underway. (Interestingly, an experiment with "Aerobics" using the Doubles Court area was unsuccessful and was discontinued after a three-month trial). The gym has been the "carrot" featured in our radio advertising and, once people have been enticed inside the door, there is the opportunity to get them playing squash. Then the next step is to enrol them in the Club Kelbum "Big Leagues" or "Team Squash". It has proved to be a very effective way to do business.

Pro-Shop sales were up by 6%, while Snacks and Drinks remained about the same, though by more judicious buying the margin was improved. New purchasing agreements with wholesalers are now in place which should further increase Club Kelbum's profitability in the new year.

There have also been increased costs in Lighting and Power (through increased usage) and Repairs and Maintenance (through necessity). Depreciation also increased, particularly on gym equipment. Most other costs have remained at similar levels to the 1995-96 year.

An end-of-year surplus up 29% on last year is a very satisfying result because it has been achieved in an environment where squash clubs are fighting to retain members and where many single-purpose gyms have earned smaller returns in the last year. In fact, in recent months, two gyms in Wellington ceased trading altogether.

The Club Kelburn formula is to operate as an all-purpose leisure club, open to casuals and members alike, offering a special blend of squash and gym. However, it has not been easy and competing with other leisure businesses requires assertive marketing and a flexible response to changing sport and leisure trends. I also want to thank Steve Scott who often works "behind the scenes". With the help of these people, it has been an enjoyable year as well as a profitable one.

GRADINGS & STATISTICS

The NZ Squash Grading System contains 20,000 players and forms part of the National Club Member Register.

The past season has seen the continuation of the changes put in place in 1995, which were intended to gradually move to a more even spread of players across the B to F grades.

Current player numbers across all grades show that the changes have had the desired effect. The "bottom end bulge" with 70% of players in E & F grades in 1994, has been substantially reduced and only 46% of players are now in E & F grades. Also, as was intended there has been a steady, but slow increase in B grade numbers, while the elite status of the A1 and A2 grades has been maintained where numbers have increased very slightly. The C & D grade numbers have remained relatively constant.

The reduction of the E & F grade numbers and the more even spread of players across the B to D grades has had a number of beneficial and positive effects, particularly in the areas of; public/sponsor/player perception of the ability of the "average" club player; increased entries for B and C grade tournaments; increased entries in the B and C grades of the national graded teams event, both at district and national levels.

Current policy is that the even spread of "club" players across the range of E to B2 grades should be maintained and that the "average club player" should be in the C2/D1 grades and not the E/F grades as was the case prior to 1995.

The NZ Squash Grading System continues to be the backbone of competitive squash in New Zealand. The successful operation of the system is due to the considerable input of time and effort by the Club and district statisticians and thanks must be extended to them for their work which benefits individual players and the sport of squash as a whole.

Eve has also had a long involvement with club and Waikato management and in recent years has made a considerable contribution to master squash in the Waikato.

Men's and Women's Statistician is **Keith Kiwara** — a member of the Tokoroa Squash Club. Keith took over the position this season from Dilys Russell who was BOP district statistician for many years. NATIONAL EVENTS

The National Coaches View

Yet another very active squash season is drawing to a close with many events having taken place.

The season started in earnest with the North Island Junior Champs held at the Palmerston North Club. This was also the first selection event for the U19 Junior Women's team where there was some great squash played over the weekend highlighted by two superb matches in the U19 age groups. Firstly Hayley King refused to give up against Lara Petera and came back from match ball down to win in five. Likewise in the U19 men's semi-final where Phil Anderson looked dominant against Peter Wyatt until Peter came back in a tight match to win in five.

From this tournament also stemmed the selection for the first National squad of the season which surely must have been the biggest camp for elite players run in New Zealand to date. A very active six-day programme kicked off with a Regional Coaches meeting to discuss the programme for the season plus participation in a workshop looking at level one delivery. An extremely useful two days with some good exchange of ideas. Immediately following this was the South Island Junior Champs at Invercargill and very ably co-ordinated by Southland Development Officer and Regional Coach, Vaughan Utteridge. Once again a great Junior entry considering a venue so far south but having the added attraction of U19 Junior Women's selection and Junior rankings depending on results with a bonus extra two days training camp for the top 32 players from a full compliment of Regional Coaches and the wonderful extra help from Sue McBain and Dave Madden. The squad proved to be a huge success with the split venues, a presentation by Jan McAra of Mercury TV (and a council member) on promoting yourself as a player plus to top it all, a few words from the new CEO David Knowles. Phil Anderson must be thanked for a marvellous High Impact aerobic session which was enjoyed by all including Mark Devoy who could not move for several days afterwards!

Each Regional Coach has now run three Junior Regional Squads, with the exception of Graeme Randolph who had to cancel one due to lack of interest on the date set. By the end of the season there will have been six National Squads run covering all the age groups from U13 — U19 boys and girls.

An enormous programme was launched by myself, Robyn Brownlee and Susan Devoy in coaching and preparing the U19 girls team for the World Champs resulting in a second place achievement (starting with a win over Australia) making the whole effort completely worthwhile. They were a great team to work with and a huge commitment was made by all involved. To Susan and Robyn; my sincere thanks for returning to the court to help produce this excellent result. I look forward to our continuing association.

At the same time as the Junior World Women's Champs in Brazil, Leilani Joyce and Daniel Sharplin were representing NZ at the world games in Lahti, Finland. Leilani once again showed her improvement by beating England's Sue Wright for a bronze medal while Daniel failed to make the top four but vowed to come back to New Zealand for the Nationals.

Moving into the last part of the season, the National Champs were held at North Shore with last minute sponsorship from Chances Sports Bar. I must have witnessed what I consider to have been the best squash match played since my arrival in New Zealand between Daniel Sharplin and Glen Wilson. Those who were fortunate to have seen this match were treated to a very fair, evenly matched game with no less than total commitment from both players. Paul Steel and Leilani Joyce took the two National Titles and thoroughly deserved the rewards of a season's hard work.

The men's team for the World Champs in Kuala Lumpur during November was announced following the Nationals; a new player was in the frame for selection in the guise of Michael Corrin having worked very hard over the last year not only on his game but in attaining New Zealand citizenship. For a number of seasons now he has been a good domestic touring pro taking many titles all around NZ and now broadening his horizons by moving on to the PSA circuit. The team selection was very tough with Wayne Werder just edging Mike out of the fourth place. Paul Steel, Daniel Sharplin, Glen Wilson and Wayne Werder were ably managed by Neven Barbour.

December sees us facing a new challenge in Squash with the World's first Doubles event in Hong Kong. This will be a very steep learning curve for all involved. The representative team will be Paul Steel, Daniel Sharplin, Wayne Werder, Leilani Joyce, Phillipa Beams and Angie Toal accompanied by myself as Coach/Manager. This event is to be used as a benchmark for the 1998 Commonwealth Games.

Aside from all these National events a promising International involvement continues to grow. Browns Bay club had the foresight to invite a young English player, Iain Higgins, to join their team for interclub and Cousins Shield. Return air fare, use of vehicle and accommodation were all provided and organised by John Vincent. Carol Owens is a regular visitor to Open events and plays for Henderson. There is a need to make overseas visitors welcome in order to improve playing standards, create variety of matches and gain from the invaluable experience that these stronger players have to offer. If any clubs are looking for International players for next season please contact me as I have been able to help out.

Talking on the grapevine to those A graded players out in the regions, please remember to look after your wonderful squash tournament calendar by ensuring that you show your appreciation to the members who run these events and to the hard found sponsors who regularly contribute prizes and cash. Give a little of yourself back. So, altogether an eventful season with many improvements being made in the Junior section which must surely be where the future of NZ Squash lies.



THANK YOU, GOODBYE AND GOOD LUCK

With the closing of the 1997 year, New Zealand Squash loses one of the indefatigable characters of the sport when Barry Gardiner retires as President of the Association. There aren't many gentlemen like him.

People know Barry as a quiet and dignified man, always wise and considerate of others. He has been a champion of the little courtesies, often writing personal notes to congratulate players, coaches and event organisers. He was hurt this year by the funding cuts which prevented him from travelling to national events and discharging his duties as President.

He has been a selfless servant of squash for 35 years but not many people are aware of the full extent of his commitment to sport, either as a player or as an administrator.


As a participant, Barry played Rugby League for New Zealand in 1958 and was an All Black trialist in 1965. He ran his first marathon in 1980 and he won the World Masters Singles Squash title (for the over 50's) in 1991. These few memorable highlights should not obscure a host of provincial and district honours achieved in League, Rugby, Cricket, Squash, Tennis and Athletics.

Never content to rest, Barry has been equally active as an administrator. He has been selector, coach, manager, vice-president, chairman and patron in four squash districts, often founding clubs and establishing new programmes. And not only in squash. He has been rugby radio commentator and an energetic organiser in league, rugby, cricket, tennis and athletic clubs.

He is retiring as President of New Zealand Squash (in his typically modest way) because he believes squash is a young person's game and so has 'disqualified' himself by turning 60 next year. But he won't be an idle or an ordinary sixty-year-old.

His mission is to complete the "Coast to Coast" one-day event (traversing the South Island) in February 1998 and he is already in serious training. It is this quite exceptional dedication and courage which makes Barry Gardiner such a remarkable New Zealander.

He has been a life-long friend of squash. Thank you Barry. Goodbye and good luck but please don't be a stranger.



CLUB OF THE YEAR

The 1997 "Squash Club of the Year" has been won by the Reporoa Squash Club.

A year ago the club faced closure. There were the classic signs of a club in trouble: dwindling membership, dilapidated facilities, and low morale. A public meeting decided that the club was too important, not only as a sports facility but, in a rural landscape, as a vital community centre as well.

Lead by President Anita Kingma and a busy team of helpers, new business plans were developed to restore club pride, build a vibrant membership, and secure a stronger financial base. As Anita said at the time: "If the club was wound-up, squash would never have been re-established in Reporoa".

As the plans became reality, the club was completely refurbished, new social and sporting events were created and coaching was made available to people of all ages and abilities. An energetic fundraising programme targeted local sponsors and public sector grants and a commitment was made to retire debt systematically.

The links to other community and sports groups were strengthened by joint venture initiatives. Promotion and publicity for the club was "managed" to increase the profile of the club.

The results were immediately obvious. The membership has nearly doubled in the last year. The facilities are attractive and available to a wider cross-section of the community. There is a strong sense of 'ownership' and the mood in the club is buoyant. Where there was apathy and indifference, there is now enthusiasm and pride.

The Lion Foundation's grant of \$2,000 to Reporoa as the "Club of the Year" is tangible and very welcome recognition for a club which has learnt the twin lessons of self help and customer service.

By the time we left team and management had tracksuits, skirts, T-shirts and socks and we took six supporters with us. A total of 14 people.

Betty and I worked together with the coaching and managing of the team.

As part of the Association's financial management systems, effective controls have been implemented and maintained to provide reasonable assurance as to the integrity and reliability of financial reporting. We are satisfied that these financial statements fairly reflect the financial position and operation of the Association for the reporting period.

1 - ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Statement of Accounting Policies

Differential Reporting

New Zealand Squash (Inc) is the New Zealand National Sporting Organisation responsible for the control, advancement and regulation of the game of squash throughout New Zealand. New Zealand Squash (Inc) is incorporated under the Incorporated Societies Act 1908.

The Association qualifies for differential reporting as it is not publicly accountable and does not qualify as "large" as defined within the Institute of Chartered Accountants of New Zealand's framework for differential reporting. The entity has taken advantage of all the differential reporting exemptions available to it.

Measurement Base

The accounting principles recognised as appropriate for the measurement and reporting of earnings and financial position on an historical cost basis have been followed. Accrual accounting is used to match income and expenditure.

Specific Accounting Policies

The following specific accounting policies which materially affect the measurement of financial performance and of financial position have been applied:

Operating Leases

Operating lease payments, where the lessors effectively retain substantially all the risks and benefits of ownership of the leased items, are included in the determination of operating profit in equal installments over the term of the lease (refer Note 3).

Finance Leases

The Association leases certain office equipment and motor vehicles. Finance leases, which effectively transfer to the entity substantially all the risks and benefits incidental to ownership of the lease term, are capitalised at the present value of the minimum lease payments. The lease assets and corresponding liabilities are disclosed and the leased assets are depreciated using the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 1994 (refer Note 4).

Stock

Stock has been valued at the lower end of cost or net realisable value. Due allowance has been made for slow moving stock.

Goods & Services Tax

The financial statements have been prepared on a GST exclusive basis.

Fixed Assets

All fixed assets are recorded at cost less accumulated depreciation to date. Depreciation has been provided at the maximum rates permitted by the Income Tax Act 1994.

Investments

Investments are loans advanced to clubs for renovations and development and are stated at cost.

Changes in Accounting Policies

There have been no changes in accounting policies. All policies have been applied on a basis consistent with those used in previous years.

2 - INVENTORY COMMITMENTS

No inventories are specifically and separately pledged as security for liabilities. Inventory is subject to retention of title clauses.

AUDIT REPORT

To the readers of the financial report of New Zealand Squash (Inc).

We have audited the financial reports as presented. The financial report provides information about the past financial performance of New Zealand Squash (Inc) and it's financial position as at 30 September 1997. This information is stated in accordance with the accounting policies as set out.

New Zealand Squash (Inc) Responsibilities

The Executive Council is responsible for the preparation of the financial report which fairly reflects the financial position of the Association as at 30 September 1997 and of the results of operations for the year ended 30 September 1997.

Auditor's Responsibilities

It is our responsibility to express an independent opinion on the financial report presented by the Executive Council and report our opinion to you.

Basis of Opinion

An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial report. It also includes assessing:

- the significant estimates and judgments made by the Executive Council in the preparation of the financial report, and
- whether the accounting policies are appropriate to the Association's circumstances, consistently applied and adequately disclosed.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards in New Zealand except where our work was limited as explained below. We planned and performed our audit so as to obtain all the information and explanations which we considered necessary in order to provide us with sufficient evidence to give reasonable assurance that the financial report is free from material misstatements, whether caused by fraud or error. In forming our opinion we also evaluated the overall adequacy of the presentation of the information in the financial report.

Other than in our capacity as auditors we have no relationship with or interest in the Association.

Qualified Opinion

Control over cash sales for Club Kelburn prior to being recorded is limited. There was no system of control over such sales on which we could rely for the purpose of our audit and there were no satisfactory audit procedures that we could adopt to confirm independently that all cash sales were properly reconciled. In this respect alone we have not obtained all the information and explanation that we have required.

In our opinion, except for the adjustments that might have been found necessary had we been able to obtain sufficient evidence concerning cash sales, the financial report of Club Kelburn fairly reflects the results of the operations for the year ended 30 September 1997.

In our opinion the financial report fairly reflects the financial position of New Zealand Squash (Inc) as at 30 September 1997. Our audit report was completed on 7 November 1997 and our qualified opinion is expressed as at that date.
